CONTRACT BRIDGE

1. You are declarer when the West hand at Six Clubs. North leads the king of diamonds. First let's suppose that South show out. With the king and return the ten, discarding a heart from dummy. North wins with the jack, but whatever he returns, you discard the last heart from dummy as you ruff the return in your hand. All you lose is a spade card. Second, let's suppose that South follows low on the five of spades. First let's suppose that if it wins, you have twelve tricks because North must return a heart from dummy after discarding a heart from dummy. You then cash the king of spades, discarding the other heart from dummy. 2. Here the contract is not certain to make, but still it is a best way playing the hand. The key play is to duck the jack of diamonds, hoping to find the suit divided 3-3. In that case you could later, after drawing trumps and cashing the A-K of diamonds, discard a spade from dummy on the first of diamonds. It is important to provide against the possibility that North has some such hand as SAQ984 HR DJ10 CK92. If you were to win the opening lead, you would then have no way of preventing South from later taking the lead and making the killing spade return.

Texas Fee Keep Guilt Over FBI Assassination

The man charged with assassinating President Kennedy was a Communist sympathizer. He lived in Dallas less than three months. Yet he may people the world over. Immediately belated, he was himself — and Texas at large — as the cause of the present confusion.

By JULES LOH DALLAS (AP)—Some remind you quickly that it could have happened anywhere—and so, of course it could. But Texas is not a state that is reluctant to press the point too strongly or find solace in excuses. For even though the accused assassin, through an irony of history, was a professional Marxist rather than a demoted rightist, nearly all Texans still are.

It is not surprising that the piercing realization that hate breeds hate has fascinated fatalism and that if John F. Kennedy was destined to be assassinated it wasn't at all illogical it should happen in his state and this is where those who openly hated his guts could wear a veneer of respectability, while denouncing his Washington and all its works and pomps had become a parlor game among the fashionable, when crusades of suspicion, in the phrase of the fallen president, seem easily to spawn and fester.

Texas also is a state, however thin just as a minute, moneyed and articulate hate group is not representative of the state. Dallas and its political climate are not representative of all of Texas.

Texas knows this. But reflecting on the incredible nightmare that unfolded and unfolded elsewhere, but in Texas, the world cannot help wondering what sort of place Texas is, and what sort of people come from its soil and whether "frontier justice" remains a tall tale in this state. The answers aren't easily cast, but it should be noted at the start that the differences between Texas and other American states are more obvious than important.

Texas is the land of the overdrawn pasture; the big boss and the big hunter and the big man. It is the unbettered sorrow of having said too much.

Texas is the land of self-sufficiency, of fierce pride, of not taking no for an answer; the land where a man can stand at least as himself. If Texas, today are want to disown

The easy answers provided by extremists to solve the world's ills find a good many receptive ears in Texas. The sun sometimes provides, for Texans, a light and simple solution.

Texas juries tend to be lenient when they can discover what they consider a plausible reason for provocation. For example, or even strong suspicion of it.

On the other hand juries generally give short shrift to persons who commit crimes of passion or cowardice. There is little doubt what would be the fate of the assassin of a president were he tried in Texas.

Rooted in tradition The reason Texas is the way they are is rooted in the history and culture of the state; in the same tradition that best help explain why Texas, especially certain parts of it, is such a state of breeding ground for extremism.

The inordinate state pride, first of all, contribute much to Texas' grudge against those who are unaffiliated to some easterners, but the state has a history proud enough for many a nation.

Every month you list the names and great deeds of the lusty, drawing Texas folk here and there. From James Bowie, Dave Crockett, Big Foot Wallace, Deaf Smith—and the rest of the heroes of the Alamo, Goliad, San Jacinto. And who not.

More important in the chemistry of a Texas is his feeling of self-reliance, the quality so attractive to some easterners, but the state has a history proud enough for many a nation.

But for decades it has been the one from which thought emanates, they'll make sure the wealth came to be admired and the owners of it listened to—much more so than in sprawling, big-rich, unich Houston.

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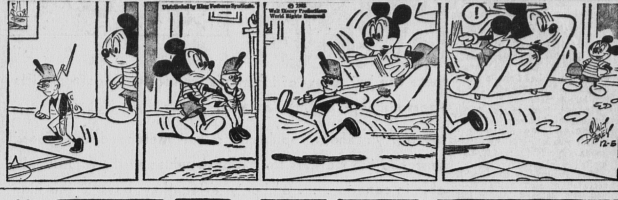
