considered one of Iran's richest men, with a net worth of \$100 million, the country's government from 1951 to 1953. He is believed to be past 70.

LONG LEGAL BATTLE

Long anti-British, he was the leader in a successful fight to get parliament to nationalize oil in March, 1951. Less than a month later he was made premier to implement the new act.

Then began the long legal battle with Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. over compensation for its nationalized Iranian properties, a fight that is still unsettled.

Mossadegh resigned July 16, 1952 in a government crisis and was succeeded by ex-premier Ahmed Qavam. But street riots inspired by Mossadegh's supporters, who by then included the outlawed Communists, forced Qavam out of office two days later, and Mossadegh was soon back in power.

Santa Claus To Visit Air Force, Army In Europe

OTTAWA, (CP) - Santa Claus will trade his sled and reindeer for a plane when he visits the children of RCAF personnel this year in the United Kingdom and Europe.

He'll arrive from the North Pole in a twin-engine RCAF aircraft with an escort of speedy Sabre jets.

The army said plans have been completed for Christmas celebrations for the 6,000 men with the new 1st Canadian Infantry brigade in Europe. The emphasis will be on religious services with midnight masses planned for Christmas Eve in five camps in the Soest area of Germany and masses and communion services Christmas Day.

The army men and their dependents will consume 5,000 pounds of turkey, 1,900 pounds of assorted nuts, 1,200 pounds of tinned fruit, 1,250 pounds each of fruit cake and plum pudding, and 625 pounds of cranberry sauce.

Slim Santa

A highlight of the day will be the issue of 500,000 cigarettes, a gift from the Province of Ontario.

Santa will arrive at the RCAF base at Langar, Eng., in a decorated RCAF Bristol freighter.

The Christmas party guests will be orphan children from the area around the base.

A bright red fire truck will meet Santa when he lands at the Zweibrücken air base in Germany. He will preside over a Christmas party for the children of personnel at Zweibrücken and Baden-Soellingen.

The yuletide customs of France will be enjoyed by airmen and dependents stationed at Metz. In France, Santa appears as a slim, old man and he travels by donkey over the roof tops with his gifts.

Let's Talk It Over

Mayor Wedge's suggestion that a new street be constructed along Summerside's waterfront seems a particularly happy one which should meet with virtually everyone's approval. The feature which is being stressed is that it will relieve traffic congestion on our main street, and a new highway south of the present main artery should indeed do that.

Another pretty important result which should follow is an improvement in the town's appearance. A highway skirting Summerside harbour, clear of all business establishments on the south side, could be, if not actually a thing of beauty, and consequently as Keats put it, "a joy forever", at least a great improvement in picturesque effect over our present set-up. A highway fringing the water invariably makes for pleasure and driving, and the green bordering the highway would be ideal for park benches.

From the standpoint of a civic beauty display, Summerside's large apples are all at the bottom of the barrel. The town ranks fairly high in scenic attractiveness. Many of its streets are tree-lined, it has fine buildings, and its parks compare well with towns of its size. But strangers passing through the town via Water Street might easily get an unfavorable impression. This newly proposed highway would provide a face-lifting job that should help to change all that.

Official Opening Of New Kensington Federal Building On January 7

The new federal building at Kensington will be officially opened on Thursday, January 7, by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., who in making the announcement yesterday said the building, which has been constructed by the M. F. Schurman Co., is now completed.

He said the post office in the new building could have been opened before Christmas except for the inconvenience that the post master would have experienced in having to move during the rush period of Christmas.

This steel frame, brick faced building, 52 x 24, contains the new post office, quarters for the R.C.M.P., and an office for the Department of Agriculture.
