

She Has Made A Vocation Of Art For Medicine's Sake

MONTREAL (CP) — Eleanor Sweezy has made a vocation of art for medicine's sake. In the medical circles she is known as the illustrator of two authoritative books by Dr. Wilder Penfield, director of the Montreal Neurological Institute. Dr. Penfield also used illustrations done by Miss Sweezy when he gave a series of lectures recently in England.

Officially she's supervisor of medical illustration at Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital and adviser to the department of veterans affairs on medical illustration in their nine hospitals from Halifax to Vancouver.

Her department has two photographers and an administrative assistant who helps prepare graphs and charts. It looks after all medical illustration requests ranging from sketches in color or black and white, to lantern slides, still photographs and movies for medical meetings and plaster models of parts of the body.

ARTIST FROM CHILDHOOD

Miss Sweezy started drawing when she was going to elementary school. She took lessons at the Montreal Art Gallery and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree from Queen's University, Kingston.

She then decided to go into medical illustrating and returned to Queen's for a year of pre-med science, including studies of comparative anatomy. She took a two-year course in art as applied to

medicine at Johns Hopkins University and returned to Montreal where she free-lanced for two years before she was appointed to her present position 12 years ago.

Miss Sweezy may spend as much as five hours in the operating room sketching while a photographer takes movies and still photographs. These usually are for medical records but are sometimes included later in teaching films.

"A photo can't show the underlying structures," she said. A sketch may be better because it simplifies and takes out details and operating room drapes which obstruct the picture the surgeon wants to pass on to students.

"A sketch can show typical procedure rather than the details of an individual case."

But movies have proved valuable in teaching and diagnosis, and Miss Sweezy therefore has also become a "movie producer". She writes the script of a medical film, holds story conferences with the photographer, doctors and other hospital workers, directs the shooting, edits the films, has titles prepared and even dubs in sound-tracks.

And to make 1957 a busier year for her is the annual convention of the Medical Illustrators, to be held in Montreal for the first time next October. There are only two members in the city to make all the arrangements for the gathering of about 60 delegates.
