The Clergy and the Press

Rev. W. W. Brewer, a Methodist clergyman of Charlottetown, who has accepted a call to the Central Church here, is just now engaged in a controversy with the newspaper press of the Island capital.

It is a little surprising to find a gentleman of Mr. Brewer's attainments indulging in a cheap and superficial criticism of the press; but if he has been shocked by the newspapers in Charlottetown when he comes to the mainland his superlativeness is likely to be horrified.

No good is to be done by suppressing the truth. The newspaper editor's daily duty is to combat the influences which bear from Monday morning to Saturday night, repressing the publication of news which their vocation and the public needs demand should be published, and no class acts as the mediator in such cases more frequently than clergymen.

It is not the punishment inflicted by the courts which the ordinary offender fears half as much as he does the publicity by the press given to the offence associated with his name. The press is as much an effective moral police as is the pulpit.

Unpleasant as it may be—and as are all the surroundings—yet the story of the unfortunate girl, her sin, her shame, her death; the arrest and possible punishment of the accessories to the crime which caused the latter; and conveying a terrible warning to thousands of young women and young men throughout the land.

The Bible which sets the best example of an editor's work presents the world as it is—virtue and sin—honor and shame—light and shadow—side by side with the lines of contract and the lessons inculcated strongly brought out. No false sentimentality caused a halt in the work.
