New Brunswick's Fealty To Crown Is Demonstrated

(By John Mosher, Canadian Press Staff Writer) SAINT JOHN, N. B., June 13—Winning renewed allegiance as they neared the end of their precedent-smashing visit to Canada and the United States, King George and Queen Elizabeth spent a busy day in New Brunswick—the seventh province on their route.

Glorious weather favored the royal occasion from the time the Sovereigns made their first Maritime Province appearance at Newcastle this morning until they left Moncton tonight for an undisclosed stopping place between there and Cape Tormentine.

Tomorrow the Canadian destroyer Skeena will carry Their Majesties across Northumberland Strait to Charlottetown, capital of Prince Edward Island. Then follows visits to Pictou and New Glasgow in Nova Scotia before dark, and on Thursday comes seven hours of farewell festivities before the Royal couple sail for Newfoundland and home on the Empress of Britain.

Ahead of Schedule

The Newcastle arrival at 10:18 p.m., A.D.T. was two minutes ahead of schedule. The subsequent 108-mile trip to Fredericton, longest automobile drive the King and Queen have taken since their historic tour started at Quebec...

The Queen was charming in a gray-blue ensemble trimmed with white fur. Her perky straw hat had white curls, and she wore forget-me-nots. Gloves and shoes were of matching gray, and she wore two-stranded pearls. The King was attired in morning clothes.

Welcomed at Capital

The official welcome to New Brunswick was extended at Fredericton, where Their Majesties attended a luncheon given by Lieutenant-Governor Murray MacLaren and the Provincial Government.

The welcome by school children in New Brunswick was as enthusiastic as any given in the Dominion. Seven thousand were gathered in one group at Fredericton, 8,000 assembled at the Barrack Green in Saint John and 5,000 paraded past the railway station during the brief stop at Moncton.

HALIFAX SET TO WELCOME ROYAL COUPLE

HALIFAX, June 13—(CP)—Halifax tonight rushed the finishing touches to preparations for a welcome to King George and Queen Elizabeth as they neared the end of their precedent-smashing visit to Canada and the United States.

The first groups of an influx that will be the greatest in Halifax's 190-year-old history thronged the streets today. Office buildings and stores—led by a utilities company—were almost hunkered behind bunting and flags. Evident dwellings far removed from the route of the Royal processions were lit up.

Everywhere throughout the Province, in farmhouse, city, town or village dwelling the story was the same last night, preparing for this morning's early start to see the King and Queen. And in many cases for those who lived at some distance there was little thought of sleep.
