## Commons Clash Is On Council

OTTAWA (CP) — A Liberal backbencher and a former Conservative cabinet minister differed sharply in the Commons Monday night on the merits of the government's plan to set up an economic council.

Pauline Jewett (L. — Northumberland), a political scientist and economist, ticked off a string of improvements which she claimed the Liberal government's bill had made in the idea put forward in the last Parliament by the Conservatives.

QUEBEC (CP) — Premier Jean Lesage confirmed Monday that he will attend the federal-provincial conference in Ottawa July 28 and 29 to study the proposed federal plans on a municipal loan fund.

During a brief visit to his office, the premier commented on the announcement by Prime Minister Pearson that the conference would be held in the province. Mr. Lesage was scheduled to return immediately to his fishing holiday.

Last Thursday before the close of the Quebec legislative session, Mr. Lesage sent Mr. Pearson the text of a unanimous resolution passed by the Legislative Assembly protesting against the unilateral creation of a municipal development fund by the federal government.

The letter accused the prime minister of going back on his promise made during the last federal election campaign that he would not do anything in this area without consulting the provinces.

A first letter from Mr. Lesage to Mr. Pearson dated June 7 was not answered. The resolution was adopted on the initiative of the opposition Union Nationale party. It assured the provincial government of its support in defending provincial prerogatives in the matter of aid to municipalities.

Winnipeg (CP) — Premier Duff Roblin said Monday he is "very interested" in Prime Minister Pearson's proposal to discuss low interest loans to municipalities at a federal-provincial conference in Ottawa this month.

Mr. Roblin added that while attending the July 27th conference he may suggest an alternative to the federal program.

He indicated he may ask the conference that a full-scale federal provincial conference on all matters of concern to the provinces be called as soon as possible.

REGINA (CP) — Premier to power would not be repeated.

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## Echoes From Rift Heard In Europe

LONDON (AP) — Repetitions from the Soviet-Chinese rift developed Monday in Europe.

In Brussels, the Belgian Communist party announced the execution of the letters of Henri Ginepro for pro-Chinese views. It brought to five the number expelled thus far from those groups.

Pro-Chinese slogans have been scrawled on numerous factory walls in Milan during recent days. They proclaimed "Viva Chinese Communism," "Long Live Mao" and "China is Near us."

Milan is a centre of Communist strength in Italy. Armando Cossiga, the local party secretary, called the scribbling only a minor manifestation. But Luigi Longo, another secretary, set up a discussion Monday on the subject "Problems of unity in the workers' movement and the Communist Internationale."

In Paris the Communist Daily Humain called for the unity of the Soviet-Chinese exchange. It said the French Communists could support "the unity of the International Communist movement."

Yves Moreau said in a syndicalist journal that he confirmed the "pro-Chinese character" of the Peking-Moscow divergence.
