

United Church Y.P.U. Rally At Kensington

The annual spring rally of Central Presbytery Young People's Unions of the United Church was held in Kensington commencing on Saturday evening, continuing yesterday afternoon, and concluding last evening.

About 60 delegates were registered on Saturday evening by Joan Craig of Middleton, and enjoyed a delicious banquet served by the C.G.T. of Kensington Church, assisted by the W.M.S. The blessing was asked by Rev. J. K. Campbell of the P.E.I. Presbytery.

All sessions were presided over by the president, William Moore of Summerside. Rev. L. M. Murray of Kensington welcomed the young people to the fellowship of the church for the rally. This was responded to by Edward Pearson of Beauceville.

Literature on the new Atlantic Christian training centre at Tatamagouche, N.S., was distributed. Rev. Mr. Murray then led in a hymn sing.

The Summerside Union, represented by Dorothy Townsend, Robert Linkletter and Ernest Murphy then presented a short practical skit entitled "First Things First," which was the theme for the whole rally.

The evening's guest speaker, Mr. Allison Profit of Freetown, was then introduced by the president. His thought-provoking words related stories from the Bible to show how well the Master handled all the situations He faced. "God has given us our lives, we have them in our hands, to do as we please," said Mr. Profit in urging the young people to seek to do good.

The business session was conducted by the president, the minutes of the fall rally were read by secretary-treasurer Evelyn Underhay of Summerside, who also gave her treasurer's report. Roll call was responded to by groups representing Summerside, Kensington, Travellers Rest, Beauceville, Malpeque, Margate, Rose Valley, Breadalbane and Tryon.

A report on the year's activities was given by a spokesman for each Union, all of which show considerable activity.

Most showed that their financial obligations had been met, and that support had been given to various organizations. A letter was read from the Maritime Conference asking for nominees to serve on the Maritime executive of the Y.P.U. to be elected at the annual convention in Moncton this coming Thanksgiving weekend.

To Visit Son's Grave

Victor Sanderson (above) of 353 Cedar Avenue in Summerside, a veteran of World War I, will for the first time be visiting the grave of his son, Flt. Sgt. Kimball Sanderson, who was killed Sept. 2, 1942, while serving with the R.C.A.F. on a mission over enemy territory. On this pilgrimage, Mr. Sanderson will visit the graves of any island service men whose family contact him before his departure on May 23. Mr. Sanderson hopes to record his visits to these cemeteries on color film and on his return may be able to give several island families their first view of the resting place of their sons and husbands. On this tour, the Clair Millar Pilgrimage, about 1,000 Canadians are expected to attend and Mr. Sanderson, as far as is known, is the only islander listed. He will be returning about mid-July.

Fire Guts Legion Hall At Borden Saturday Night

Fire early Saturday night gutted the Canadian Legion Hall at Borden. Legion members estimated it would take approximately \$8,000 to replace the building and equipment destroyed. There was a small amount of insurance on the building.

A resident nearby noticed smoke coming from the one-storey wooden building about 7:15 Saturday night. The Borden fire department extinguished the blaze after a stubborn battle but not before the whole interior was gutted. Only a charred outer shell remains.

Included in the loss was approximately 100 folding chairs, a piano and new television set. The building was originally a Boy Scout building was later purchased by the legion.

Origin of the blaze is unknown. No one was in the building, which was locked up.

When the fire broke out Legion members were busy unloading cement for the foundation for a new Legion home. It was understood that work on the new structure will begin shortly. The basement has already been excavated.

Firemen did a good job in preventing the flames from spreading. A barn owned by Jack Gillis was separated from the Legion hall by only a few feet.

The hall was located across the street from the Borden rink.
