Forester Warns Fire Hazard High

"The fire hazard looks bad for the weekend" warned Provincial Forester, G. Gaudet last night.

He was referring to the large amount of grass and woods fires across the province this week. "Terrible," was how he described it. "Everybody seems to be sending in alarms," he said. "People don't seem to be using good judgment. The woods are terribly dry and it doesn't take much to start a fire."

Mr. Gaudet said yesterday fires were reported in the St. Peter's Bay area, the Dundas area and in western P.E.I. He said Thursday four or five fires were reported.

One woods fire started as the result of a lightning bolt between Churchill and New Haven on the Trans-Canada Highway. A car driven by Allan Lorne MacLean of Borden overtook on the road, catching on fire and also setting the nearby woods ablaze.

MacLean was not injured, although his car was a total loss.

Mr. Gaudet stated that a serious fire like that of 1960 could erupt if citizens did not use caution.

He said his department has two fire trucks, one in the hertoe area, and one in the Charlottetown area. Each truck carries 1,500 gallons of water and about three or four thousand feet of hose. The trucks are equipped with a two-way valve system that permit them to draw pond water or water from other fire trucks' bodies of water in a fire-infected region where the 1,200 gallon supply was exhausted.

Mr. Gaudet expressed grave concern over the coming long weekend, and hoped that citizens would use extreme caution when lighting fires.

Official Quits Teamsters After Quarrel With Hoffa

WASHINGTON (CP) — Sam Baro, one-time major figure in Canadian labor battles, broke with the Teamsters Friday after refusing to withdraw an assault charge against union chief Jimmy Hoffa.

Hoffa, a short, stocky 49-year-old, pleaded not guilty to a charge of having beaten up a 59-year-old Baro in a fight in 1959.

Baro, the union's field director for the National Warehouse Division, said his personal friends' teamsters' executive vice-president Harold Morrison pleaded with him to withdraw the charge and forget the incident but Baro refused.

"I only wish I was 30 years younger," he said.

Baro told a reporter who was called into Hoffa's office Thursday of being cursed and accused of larceny and worthless and then being beaten by Hoffa about the eyes and face and thrown twice to the floor.

There were "several fire, decent trade unionists and some businessmen who saw the incident," Baro said.

FREE ON HAIL

Hoffa is free on \$500 bail. He faces a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and one year in jail on each count if found guilty. Under U.S. labor laws, a benefit fund guilty of causing grievous physical harm through assault can be barred from holding office for five years but legal officers doubt that the present case fits in that category.

Baro at one time was associated with Pat Conroy, labor attaché in the Canadian Embassy here, who quit as secretary-treasurer of the old Canadian Congress of Labor in 1941 because the CCL convention refused to endorse an executive decision to give Baro a job on the executive.

That was only one segment of Baro's stormy union organization career in Canada which, he said, started in 1948. At that time the CCL wanted to build up its textile union membership and Baro was selected to become Canadian director of the Textile Workers of America, affiliated with the old Congress for Industrial Organizations.

"In 1945 there were only about 400 textile members in the CCL," Baro said. "In five years we had about 20,000."

Alberton Pair Facing Break, Entry Charge

ALBERTON — Charges were brought before Alberton Magistrate Howard Clark against James LeRoy Ramsay and Raymond Walter Aborn, both of Alberton yesterday morning.

The pair are charged with break, entry and theft at Foley's store in Alberton.

The youths were apprehended in the store about 2 a.m. by members of Alberton detachment of the RCMP. A large volume of merchandise and a carton of groceries was believed packed by the pair. Articles included eight pairs of overalls, 11 lighters, bread, pie, tea, salmon and other articles and a small amount of silver. Entry was apparently made by burrowing under the building into the Alberton.

Charges were laid by Alberton policeman Ralph Hardy and the pair were remanded in custody until Tuesday when they will appear in court at Summerside.

Hoffa Indicted Over Payments

WASHINGTON (AP) — Teamsters union President James R. Hoffa was indicted by a federal grand jury Friday on charges of accepting more than \$1,000,000 in kickbacks from a Michigan trucking company.

Attorney-General Robert Kennedy announced the two-count indictment was returned in Nashville, Tenn.

He said it accuses Hoffa and the late O'Neil Brennan, former teamster vice-president, of receiving \$1,000,000 from Commercial Carriers Inc., an automobile transport company, also named as a defendant.
