A CLOSE CALL.—A mysterious shot, that was evidently fired from the street, penetrated one of the panes of the Canada House smoking room window on Saturday evening last. The bullet passed within a few inches of the head of Mr. S. W. Farnham, music teacher, who is one of the guests of the house, sending five bits of glass with considerable force against his face.—Chatham Advance.

TEACHERS' MEETING.—There was a good attendance at the Teachers' meeting in the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday evening. Mr. R. H. Campbell, of West Kent Street School, presided. After an informal talk on the time, the discussion on the best methods of teaching arithmetic was continued. The discussion had particular reference to reduction and the compound rules. Mr. Ewen Stewart, grading of floor, was the principal speaker.

DARING ROBBERY.—A daring robbery was perpetrated at the office of the Joggins railway and coal company, Amherst, one night last week. After gaining an entrance, the thieves forced open the safe, took out the cash box, which happily had little in it at the time, and then decamped. Opposite the safe was a cupboard hanging on the wall with about four hundred dollars in it done up in envelopes for the men's wages, but this escaped their notice and was left untouched.

ROW AT A WEDDING.—The Summerside Pioneer says: A man named McLean was brought down from the west last week and lodged in jail here charged with an assault. It appears that a short time ago a wedding took place at Piusville and a party from Miminigash attended without having been invited. The result was that those at the wedding put the Miminigash people out and otherwise ill-treated them and in the melee one man had an eye knocked out. This was the cause of the law proceedings having been instituted. McLean will stand his trial in the Supreme Court.

TURNED UP MISSING.—A Halifax despatch says: The grand jury of the Supreme Court this morning considered the case of the Queen vs. John P. Chetwynd, charged with forging an invoice dated January 10th, 1890, purporting to come from Tower & Co., Boston, and also with swearing to the contents being true. The jury in this case found two true bills against Chetwynd—that of forging and perjury. They also considered the case preferred against Chetwynd charging him with forging 40 different invoices and also with swearing to the truthfulness of the same. Out of the 40 charges the jury returned two more bills of forging and perjury, making four bills in all. Chetwynd is not in the city. Mr. Ritchie, acting on behalf of the Dominion Government, moved for a bench warrant for Chetwynd's arrest.
