Quarter 1 e. tiny ooked or canned shrimp. Add 2 tsp. small-diced celery and fine-chopped hard-cooked egg. Smother in 1/2 c. mayonnaise, brightened with lemon juice to taste.

Halve and hollow 2 tomatoes. Fill with shrimp. Garnish with mayonnaise and parsley.

Chicken Cratloe: Clean, wash and section 1 (3 to 3 1/2 lb.) broiler-fryer. Drain. Blot on absorbent paper towels. Place in deep saucpan.

Add 1/2 lb. smoked ham cut in 1" cubes, 12 small halved fresh mushrooms, 6 cleaned scallion bulbs, 1/4 tsp. powdered marjoram and 1/2 tsp. crushed fresh peeled garlic.

Add 3 e. strong chicken stock (in Ireland they use 2 bottles of ale instead). Simmer-cook 1 1/2 hrs. or until fork-tender.

To enchant any Irishman, make Strawberry Meringue Shortcakes of individual split meringue shells out together with sliced sugared strawberries or drained almost-frozen strawberries mixed with a little sweetened whipped cream.

Heap with a cloud of whipped cream. Decorate with green glaze fruit and serve as fast as an Irish jig!
