## New Book Discusses Lloyd George Decline

LONDON (CP) — Lord Beaverbrook throws new light into the murky scene surrounding the political collapse of David Lloyd George in a book published Monday.

Beaverbrook writes as an eyewitness, a man who knew and worked with all the principal characters in his narrative. The publisher's book restricts itself to the years 1921-22. This was the period in which the shaky Liberal Conservative Coalition was formed by Lloyd George in 1918 and disintegrated under the pressure of external crisis and internal intrigue.

In the aftermath of 1918, Lloyd George was the prime minister who had won the war, "the new deal of the jungle" to his colleagues. His friends believed he "might be prime minister for as long as he wished."

Beaverbrook himself Canadian-born, draws on unpublished political papers in his possession, especially those of Frances Stevenson, Lloyd George's secretary and later his wife. Beaverbrook describes Lloyd George as a "prime minister without a party" who "shed his friends like the embers ashed his winter coat."

By 1922 the Liberal leader had been forced into an exile from which neither he nor his party ever recovered. His last government is generally judged to have been one of the most unsavory in modern British history.

## Aviation Firm Shows Growth In Branching To New Fields

VICTORIA (CP) — A Canadian aviation company is finding its present operations and other endeavors as it seeks new avenues of expansion.

The Fairley Aviation Company of Canada, first it was airplane repair and conversion. Then it branched out into the field of aircraft measuring instruments.
