—Many friends and relatives in Prince Edward Island and elsewhere were shocked and saddened on Aug. 17 to learn of the death of Mr. James Noye in the Prince County Hospital. The son of Mr. Wallace Noye and the late Mrs. Noye of Enmore, he was 43 years of age.

In a New York hospital just five months prior to his death, the late Mr. Noye underwent a serious operation which failed to restore him to his usual good health. During convalescence at home he was tenderly cared for by his wife and family who hoped and prayed that his life would be spared.

His passing is mourned by the entire community, but it is in the home where he will be most sorely missed. Though suffering greatly, he never complained and was ever cheerful. As a neighbor and friend, he was always ready and willing to lend a helping hand in time of need.

The deceased was well known throughout the province as a contractor in bridge and wharf construction. There are left to cherish his memory his sorrowing widow, the former Ruby Penwarden, two sons and three daughters, namely, Leslie, Bernard, Jean, Shirley and Myrtle.
