MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

Various Reports Adopted—A Call to Rev. Mr. Geggie.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met yesterday (Nov 1st) and was constituted Mr A Stewart, moderator, with whom were present Messrs A McLean Sinclair, John Sutherland, John Gillis, Adam Gunn, Malcolm Campbell, D B McLeod, Roderick McLean, J W McKenzie, T F Fullerton, Geo Millar, A W K Herdman, G C Robertson, Jacob Layton, ministers, and Messrs James McLeod, John J McLeod, Hector Murchison, Wm Match, David Small, elders.

Minutes of meeting held on the second day of August were read and sustained. Messrs F C Simpson, R A Finlayson, ministers, and Archibald Kennedy and T C James, elders, were invited to sit and correspond.

The clerk intimated that Mr G M Dill had placed in his hands the resignation of the pastoral charge of the congregation in Summerside, that he had cited the congregation to appear for interest, and that Mr Clay was present as a commissioner. The resignation was then read, the commissioner heard, and Mr. Dill's adherence intimated.

On motion resolved:— To accept the resignation and to dissolve the pastoral tie, the same to take effect on and after this date.

Mr F C Simpson was appointed to declare the pulpit vacant on Sabbath first, and Mr Whidden to act as interim moderator of session.

Mr T C James presented the report of the committee appointed to allocate the amounts to be raised for the augmentation scheme by the congregations within the bounds. On motion, the report, which is as follows, was adopted:

Mr R A Finlayson was appointed to supply Dundas and Annandale for one month from Sabbath the 20th of November.

Mr Fullerton reported that he had moderated in a call to Zion Church, Charlottetown, on 31st ult., that it had come out heartily and unanimously in favor of Rev. A L Geggie, Truro, that it was signed by 226 members and 68 adherents, that it was accompanied with a guarantee of salary to the amount of \$1,400.00 per annum, and that Messrs John Campbell, and C Moore, were present as commissioners from the congregation to prosecute the call.

On motion the conduct of the moderator was approved, the commissioners were heard, the call was sustained as a regular gospel call and ordered to be transmitted to the clerk of the Presbytery of Truro.

Mr Fullerton was appointed to prosecute the call to issue before the Presbytery of Truro.

The following provisional arrangements were made for Mr. Geggie's induction, should he accept the call: The Moderator of session to arrange for the serving of the edict, and to preach and induct; Mr John Gillis to preach, Mr George Millar to address the minister, and the Moderator of Presbytery to address the people.

The Presbytery then adjourned, to meet at the call of the clerk.

LAMBS FOR BOSTON.—Mr S H Jones shipped 730 lambs to Boston yesterday. The shipment was made from Summerside.

OPERA HOUSE.—The Criterion Concert Company give their opening performance in the Opera House to night. A good entertainment is promised.

THE OMEGA ARRIVED.—The schooner Omega, Captain J J Murchison, arrived last night from Turk's Island, with a cargo of salt; fourteen days to Canoe.

ISLAND HORSES AND OATS.—A late Barbadoes circular says: Eight horses arrived per sch. Mary P. from P. E. Island sold at \$100 to \$140, P E I oats selling at \$2 50 per bag of 160 lbs.

PORK PACKING FACTORY.—Bridgewater, N S, is to have a pork packing factory, the company to be incorporated with a capital of \$25,000, and the factory to have a capacity of 75,000 hogs.

OPERA COMPANY COMING.—Arrangements are about completed for the appearance in Charlottetown about the middle of December of the Palmer Opera Company, now playing to crowded houses in Halifax.

HORSES SHIPPED.—Mr George Essery shipped yesterday a pair of draught mares to a gentleman in the neighbouring province. They weighed about 1500 lbs each, and were pronounced by good judges the best pair shipped for a long time.

AN ISLANDER INJURED.—A St Stephen, N B., despatch says: By the premature explosion of a dynamite charge in the granite quarry at Red Beach, Me., on Saturday, F McCrae, of P E Island, had his head badly injured. One eye was torn out. If no internal injuries were sustained the doctors hope to save his life. He is about fifty years of age.

VESSELS MISSING.—A St John's Nfld., despatch says: Three fishing vessels, homeward bound from Labrador, with crews aggregating 120 persons, are now much overdue. Since the recent gales the wreckage of a schooner has been found strewn all along the coast, and it is feared that she was one of the belated vessels. Arrangements have been made to despatch a search steamer.

BUTTER MAKER ARRESTED.—J Hedley Anderson, of this city, was arrested yesterday afternoon and taken to Summerside by the 4.10 train, on a charge of stealing 350 pounds of butter from Lot 16 factory. Anderson was arrested on a warrant sworn out before Leonard Morris, J P, at Summerside. Anderson, it appears, was employed in the factory at Lot 16 during the butter making season. He comes up for trial this afternoon.

MISCARriage OF JUSTICE.—A remarkable miscarriage of justice has just occurred in Rhode Island. A man attacked a young woman on a wharf last summer and practically threw her into the water, where she was drowned. Through a blunder there was no autopsy, and the state was unable to submit any proof of the cause of the girl's death. A conviction for murder would have been probably, for manslaughter certain, had the mere routine of examining the body being followed. Negligence prevented this, and the best the state could do was to indict the fellow for assault, and use his own admission as evidence. His sentence is seven years.

SUPREME COURT.

NOVEMBER 2. Yesterday a petition was presented for the examination of Mr E Bayfield Williams preparatory to admission as an Attorney in the Supreme Court. The Court reserved its decision.

Rose Simpson vs. Daniel F McDonald as Sheriff.—Tried before Mr Justice Hodgson and a Petit Jury at Georgetown, July term, 1898. Verdict for plaintiff; A Mellish for plaintiff; Matheson and Bentley for defendant. Mr Matheson is today moving for nonsuit or an arrest of Judgment.

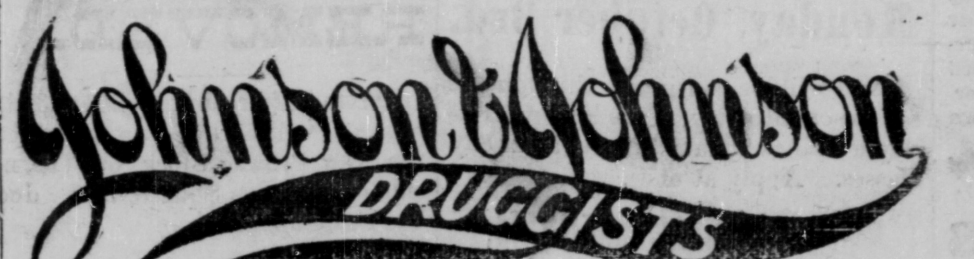
