It is my privilege as conventor of Child Welfare to present my first report as follows:

1935 has marked progress in our efforts. 103 answers were received in answer to questionnaires sent out. I find ten Institutes gave very careful study and thought to same.

Save the Child and we build a Nation. It is our duty as thinking citizens and Institute members to support all efforts for the physical and mental betterment of the growing child...

Several Institutes asked for assistance on weaving, needle work, fancy knitting, crocheting, tatting, cut work and Italian hemstitching.

Fishing is one of our main industries. Lobsters, clams and quahaugs are canned and dried and salted, oysters are raked and shipped...

A new industry was opened up in Summerside last November known as the P. E. I. Potato Bag Co. Ltd. Islanders will now make their own potato sacks.

I am most interested in stimulating our Canadian Industries. First—buying at home when possible. Second—buying in the province. Third—the Dominion.

In conclusion, I would urge one and all of you to go back to your respective Institutes resolved to boost P. E. I. Canadian or British Empire Industries and thus improve the welfare of our people.
