PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

Committees and Officials Appointed—The Wise Matter Again.

At the afternoon session yesterday the usual standing committees were appointed.

Upon the motion for the appointment of a Public Accounts committee, it was pointed out by Mr. Shaw, Mr. Campbell, Mr. Gordon and others of the Opposition that last year this committee did not submit a report. It the same force was to be enacted this year it would be a waste of public time to appoint the committee.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said that after the draft address was disposed of, the accounts would be submitted; and Mr. A. Peters intimated that when the accounts were presented the Opposition would receive a shock.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson moved that Mr. John F. Wear be appointed Law Clerk.

Mr. Campbell thought this an unnecessary expenditure of public money. There was an Attorney General who did not have a seat on the floor of the House, and he thought that gentleman had plenty of time to draft all the bills that would be required this session. Besides there was an acting Attorney General on the floor of the House in the person of the hon. member for St. Peter's.

Mr. A. A. McLean was also opposed to the appointment. He had no objection to Mr. Wear, but he thought that in view of the fact that the Attorney-General did not have a seat on the floor of the House he should perform the duties of Law Clerk.

The House then divided on the motion appointing Mr. Wear, and it was carried on a vote of 13 to 14.—Mr. Pintau being the 14th.

Hon. Mr. Gordon said it was understood that during the year important changes had taken place in the Government which he thought should be communicated to the House.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said there was no announcement to make. It was the same old government, and, like grandfather's clock, might go on forever.

Mr. Campbell—"If you have the means." (Laughter.)

Hon. Mr. Farquharson subsequently stated, in reply to a question asked by Mr. Campbell, that Mr. D. A. McKinnon was not now a member of the Executive Council.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson moved that Norman J. Campbell and William Taylor be appointed additional door-keepers for the House.

Mr. J. A. McDonald thought that there was already sufficient door-keepers. He saw no necessity for additional ones.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said that the scenes of yesterday made it necessary to have extra officials appointed, constables who would not be "strangers" to the House when it became necessary for them to do their duty. Whatever extra expense was incurred thereby was chargeable in the Opposition. It was not so much what was done yesterday as what was evidently premeditated. Heretofore the rules of the House must be promptly obeyed by members as well as by strangers. The common jail was the proper place for legislators who would not conform to the authority of the House.

This arbitrary talk of the Leader precipitated a discussion which continued until well on to 6 o'clock. The Opposition indignantly repudiated the insinuation of the Leader that they had acted in an unseemly manner during the discussion of the Wise matter, or when that gentleman was being ejected. They also repudiated any desire on their part to do anything that was not constitutional. They had acted throughout the entire matter in a constitutional manner, and would continue to do so.

It was pointed out by Mr. McLean that during the ejection of Mr. Wise, the Leader of the Government walked across the floor of the House and shook his fist in his

(McLean's) face, and that he took out his watch and apparently timed the removal of Mr. Wise. Mr. McLean also deprecated the arbitrary stand taken by the Premier who desired to do by force what he could not do constitutionally,—to remove the members on the Opposition side of the House.

Hon. Mr. Gordon and others pointed out the folly of increasing the expenses of the province by appointing two extra door-keepers when there was no necessity for them the present staff being quite sufficient. The Opposition stood to defend the rights of the people, and would do so in a constitutional way. It had not been shown that Mr. Wise was ejected by any process of law.

Mr. A. J. Macdonald condemned the premier for endeavoring to throw the blame of the disgraceful scenes of yesterday on the Opposition when it was themselves who were at fault. The disorderly conduct was closed doors. It was the government who turned out the people. Mr. Macdonald also strongly condemned the Government for appointing additional door-keepers thus, adding to the expenditures.

Mr. A. P. Prowse and others also spoke in condemnation of the extra expenditure.

But the Premier's motion was carried on a vote of 14 to 13.

Mr. A. Peters then submitted the draft address, a copy of which follows:

To His Honor the Honorable Peter Adolphus McIntyre, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island,

May it please Your Honor,—We, Her Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects in General Assembly convened, thank Your Honor for the speech with which you have opened the Legislative Assembly, and congratulate you upon the honorable position of Her Majesty's representative in this Province which Your Honor has been chosen to fill.

We have just cause for gratitude for prosperity and general improvements in trade during the past year.

We deplore with Your Honor the loss of the lives of some of our fellow Canadians in the war against the Boers; but we are proud of the practical loyalty shown by our people, and we feel confident of the speedy and victorious termination of the war.

Our people throughout this Province have shown by their contributions to the Patriotic Fund, their patriotism and devotion to Crown and Country.

We are pleased to know that the construction of the Hillsborough railway and traffic bridge will be proceeded with immediately, and that the railway to Murray Harbor is assured.

We are happy to know that the cheese and butter industry has grown so rapidly, and that the reputation of our butter and cheese is more than sustained, and the prices received satisfactory. The adoption of advanced methods in agriculture has greatly added to our material progress as a farming community.

Fruit-growing deserves the attention of our people, and we are pleased to know that advancement has been made during the past year.

We appreciate the fact that a general Exhibition, open to the other Provinces, is to be held this year.

We shall be pleased to provide ways and means for increased accommodation at the Falconwood Hospital for the Insane, and we are glad to learn of the adoption of reforms and modern methods in that institution. We will be pleased to have the report of the Commissioners.

It gives us great satisfaction to know that the delegates who went to Ottawa have had the justness of the claims presented duly recognized.

We agree with Your Honor that it is essential that our young men should be encouraged to remain at home, and are pleased to know that steps are being taken for joint action by the Governments of the Maritime Provinces to have a School of Agriculture, Horticulture and Mechanical Engineering.

We will give our best consideration to the question of Roads and Bridges.

Our Province may well feel proud of the structure erected in place of the old wooden building used as Prince of Wales College, and we know that the students coming from the whole Province will enjoy better health in the new building and have greater advantages for study.

We will be pleased to have the public accounts, and we hope under Divine guidance to legislate so as to promote the best interests of our people and province.

House then adjourned until ten o'clock on Friday.

This forenoon Mr. A. Peters began the debate on the draft address, Mr. Reid follows.

The House stands adjourned until Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.
