Funeral of Rev. Angus McDonald.

The funeral of the late Rev. Angus McDonald took place this morning and was largely attended. At 9 o'clock a solemn High Mass of Requiem, in the presence of the Bishop, was commenced at the Cathedral, which was draped in black and white for the occasion. The Celebrant was the Rev. James Phelan, of Vernon River, who had the Revs. Gregory McDonald and Donald F. McDonald as Deacon and Sub-deacon respectively. The Bishop was assisted on the throne by the Revs. Dr. Doyle and C. J. McDonald. Besides these clergymen, the following priests were present:—Revs. M. J. McMillan, Pius McPhee, A. E. Burke, Allan McDonald, Stephen Phelan, F. X. Gallant, A. J. McIntyre, John McDonald, John Chaisson, Dr. Walker, J. Corbett, G. DeFinance, and the priests of the Cathedral staff. After Mass, His Lordship pronounced the absolution, the Choir rendering the *Libera* most solemnly. Then the cortege proceeded to the New Catholic Cemetery, where all that was mortal of the dead priest were interred by the side of the late lamented Father McGillivray.

News Notes.

A large body of Scotch miners have demanded an increase of 10 per cent. in their wages and threaten a strike unless it is granted.

It is rumored at Alexandria that Sheikh Senousi, lieutenant of Abou Chema Iya, took Khartoum three weeks ago, and that the Khalifa fled.

It is reported that revolutionary pamphlets have been found upon the Czar's table in Antichkoff palace, and that a number of servants have been arrested.

At noon on Saturday last the papal decree distributing the Jesuit's estate money was formally signed by a notary public of Quebec at the instance of Premier Mercier.

The first public speeches made by Sir Charles Dilke outside of London since 1884 will be a series of addresses on the labor question, which he is to deliver shortly in the mining districts.

Nearly all the wheat in the country, says the *Winnipeg Free Press*, has been delivered. About 1,000,000 bushels are in inland elevators, and the balance, something over a million bushels, is stored at the Fort William elevator.

A conference of representatives of the United States, Germany and England to consider the Samoan affairs opened on the 29th April in Congress Hall, Prince Bismarck's residence. The session lasted an hour and fifteen minutes. On the proposal of Count Herbert Bismarck, it was decided that the strictest secrecy should govern the deliberations of the conference.

The Marquis of Londonderry in an address at a banquet at the College of Physicians, Dublin, on Saturday last, announced his resignation of the office of Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. He denied that his resignation was due to anything that Balfour had said. He accepted the office, he said, for two years and he agreed to remain the third year at the request of the Government.

The *New York Tribune* of the 29th April, in referring to the arrival the previous day from Bermuda of the captain and crew of the ship Richard P.
