BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING.

The Work That Has Been Done During the Past Year.

The six y-first annual public meeting of the P. E. Island Auxiliary Bible Society was held last evening in the First Methodist church. W. E. Dawson, Esq., President of the society, presided. The attendance was very large. The choir, led by Prof. Watts, supplied excellent music and fully sustained its high reputation.

Mr. Isaac Oxenham, secretary, read the annual report of the committee for 1899. This report showed a decrease in the sales of scriptures of 292, and that the total receipts from subscriptions were \$407.33. The sum of \$244.16 was remitted to the Parent Society as a free contribution, and \$165.84 on Purchase Account. The sum of \$25 was received from the Presbyterian church of Malpeque—an example for other congregations.

The clergymen of Summerside, Alberton, Souris, Georgetown and Montague have been invited to organize sub auxiliary societies in those towns, to co-operate with this society in carrying out the aims and objects of the Parent Society. It is earnestly hoped that this invitation will be promptly acted upon, and the society's work be thus extended.

Abstracts were then read by the secretary from the general report of the British and Foreign Bible Society, showing it to be progressing rapidly in printing and circulating Bibles.

The meeting was addressed by Rev. Leo Williams and Rev. J. K. Fraser, both of whom spoke admirably of the work. The meeting closed with God Save the Queen. Benediction was given by Rev. D. B. McLeod.

A Grewsome Superstition.

A rumor got about in a village in Russia, not far from the German frontier, that the corpse of a woman who had recently been buried had turned in the coffin. Everybody in the village not only believed the rumor, but ascribed the prevailing drought as the cause. A village council was held, and it was decided that the husband of the woman should have the coffin opened and the body replaced in its original position. The husband, however, promptly refused, and nothing could persuade him to yield to the unanimous wish of his fellow villagers, whereupon the latter took the matter in their own hands and went to the churchyard to dig up and open the coffin. To their great surprise the body lay in its original position. Their astonishment was not lessened when the legal authorities appeared on the scene and opened an inquiry, with a view of imposing punishment for the desecration of the grave.

The whole neighborhood was possessed with the idea that newly buried persons were to blame for the prevalence of the dry weather, for in another village, not far off, a grave was opened and the coffin unscrewed to pour water on the corpse. The benighted peasants of this village were of the opinion that this was the best way to induce the clerk of the weather to supply them with much needed rain.

HALIFAX PRICES.—P. E. Island potatoes are quoted at from 26 to 28c per bushel in Halifax. Island oats in bulk are quoted at from 35 to 36c.

FIRE.—A fire occurred in the Hon. Mr. Justice Holton's residence about 7.30 last evening, caused by the ignition of a curtain from a gas jet. Damage to the extent of \$200 was done. There was no insurance. The fire was extinguished before the arrival of the firemen.

The work is to be completed by the 1st of August. We have not been able to ascertain the amount of the tender.

ISLANDER'S DEATH ABROAD.—The death of Mr. James A. Macdonald, formerly of East Point, son of John D. Macdonald of that place, recently occurred in Avon, Mass. Mr. Macdonald was a fireman, and was highly esteemed in Avon. He was buried with high honors and by the firemen. St. Michael's Catholic church, where the funeral services were held, was crowded to the doors with relatives and friends, among them being town officials, and the various organizations of which the deceased was a prominent member. All denominational barriers were swept aside, the attendants at the church including persons of all faiths, who united in paying their last mark of respect to the memory of the departed.
