

but he relates how he was ill by his paramour's chocolate, says jokingly he would forgive her even if she were to poison him, and a month afterwards, just before he is supposed to poison himself, he tells his friends he is going to Blythswood-square, and actually loiters in the neighbourhood for the purpose of making the world believe he is poisoned there. Was L'Angelier likely to commit self-murder, and in such a manner as wilfully to bring on Madeline Smith the suspicion of the deed? These questions are now beyond human investigation. The jury, by their verdict, have declared their inability to decide. In this verdict we must concur; yet we see no reason for the cheering and the manifestation of joy which greeted it. Madeline Smith goes forth free from the penalties of the law—and that is all.

VIOLATION OF THE ENGLISH TOMBS AT SEBASTOPOL.—It is believed in official quarters that the expulsion of the foreign traders from Sebastopol will turn out a more serious matter than was at first supposed. One of the expelled has deposed before the English Consul that the graves of the English have been violated by men who have an authority from the Russian Government to collect any relics of the war, as shot, cannon, &c., that are saleable. This went on at Bala Clava till the Greek population interfered, and placed a watch over the cemetery, and also at Inkermann, under pretence of looking for cannon said to have been buried.

THE TROUBLES OF THE SULTAN.—According to despatches from Constantinople, the Austrian Ambassador had recommended the Turkish Government not to listen to the representations of the Envoys of France, Russia, Sardinia and Prussia, concerning the affairs of the Danubian Principalities. The Grand Vizier is reported to have said that he desired the spirit of the Treaty of Paris to be carried out with regard to those districts of the empire, but he found so much opposition that he could not follow the dictates of his conscience on this subject. It appears as if the Sultan were the victim of foreign contending interests, not knowing what to do. Meanwhile the unpopularity of Turkey in the Principalities increases, and the elections have made no progress, neither are they suspended. The police have succeeded in arresting the person who assassinated the relation of Prince Danilo. He is a Montenegrin priest, and was hired, it is said, to commit the crime for a political motive. His trial will commence in a few days.

CESSATION OF EXECUTIONS IN SPAIN.—Ninety-eight persons have been executed for the late insurrection. The Queen, by the advice of the Ministers, had caused an order to be sent by telegraph to Seville, to put an end to the executions, unless by special directions of the Government, which was to examine into each case.

STEAM COMMUNICATION BETWEEN ENGLAND AND NEWFOUNDLAND.—Private advices from England are to the effect that the British Government has agreed to guarantee £3,000 per annum, in addition to the £7,000 granted by Newfoundland for direct steam communication between England and St. John's N. F.; and that as Mr. Cunard declines terminating his mail contract for St. John's until its expiration in 1863, an arrangement will probably be made with the North Atlantic Steam Company to run a steamer fortnightly between Liverpool and St. John's.

CANADA.

The post office law took effect on the first of August. The chief alteration is, that the mails are no longer to be burdened by the immense amount of stale newspapers, sent by all classes of people to all parts of the country, passing free of postage—they will be charged one half-penny each. The Newspapers which pass free of postage are those sent by Newspaper publishers to their subscribers,—a great boon to the Press. Consequently, when any one wishes to mail any certain newspaper to a distant friend, he must buy it and mail it from the office of publication, or bring the one he may have subscribed to, to be so mailed.

Captain Rudolf, late Master of the ill-fated Steamer "Montreal,"—Louis Roberge, mate, and Jean Baptiste Dorval, pilot, have been refused bail. Mr. Allyn, counsel for Captain Rudolf, renewed his application to the court. The term was finished, and six months would elapse before the trial would come on, and bail to any amount could be given. Mr. Justice Duval is reported to have said:—"Since the former application was made to me on behalf of Rudolf, Roberge, and Dorval, the Grand Jury have returned a 'true bill' against them for manslaughter. The objection therefore against their admission to bail is stronger. It was quite impossible that the trial of the prisoners could take place during the term which has just been closed. In this matter the Crown has acted with unusual diligence, indeed, no want of diligence on the part of the Crown can be alleged. The indictment was a most important one, and it is very seldom that a bill of so special a character has been brought within so short a time. The evidence is most voluminous, and it is, therefore, the more unusual that such an indictment was prepared so soon after the finding of the Inquest. In the interest of justice I abstain from discussing at length the reasons which induce me to adhere to my previous decision, and to decline admitting to bail the parties already named."

The Toronto Pilot complains that the postponement of this trial for six months was in direct opposition to law.

A collision occurred on Lake St. Peter's, below Montreal, on the night of the 4th inst., between the steamers Quebec and Montmorency. The latter was sunk, but no lives were lost. She was laden with flour.

BANK ROBBERY IN TORONTO.—Toronto, Aug. 3.—The Upper Canada Bank was robbed on Thursday night of between £4000 and £5000.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EXAMINER.

SIR,—On looking over the *Islander* of the 31st ult., I came across a communication from that exceedingly modest man, William Heard, alias Holy Willie, purporting to be a reply to my letter in the *Examiner* of the 20th ult., in which he states that I wish the public to believe that I have been made the innocent victim of such men as James Duncan, John Ings, William Bourke and himself. You are mistaken, Brother Heard; my intention was not so much to make the impression you state, (that having previously been accomplished by the verdict of the Jury free from any quibble of law,) as to show that they were influenced by your sophistry and peculiar method of distorting facts to suit your own purpose, which have obtained for you of late such unenviable notoriety. You say that I have escaped the demands of justice—you ought to have written *injustice*, when you take into consideration the private consultation held in the ante-room of the Mayor's Court, by the Mayor, Councillor Rankin and yourself, during the examination on that celebrated "must-cap case." I suppose, on that occasion, the decision was come to, of "killing two birds with one stone," when, notwithstanding the witness produced and sworn in open Court, that I never had it or could have had it, at the time stated, (Mr. Sims also claiming it, having had it in his possession for two years,) I must be held to bail for stealing it, and Mr. Sims for reserving it. Was this the decision that you say "was so generally approved of, and regarded as the only proper course to be pursued, and which every honest man thought to be right?" If so, how comes it that you offered, unsolicited, to become one of my baillots on that occasion? Was it as an exhibition of your Christian forbearance, or was it that you knew your bail could not be taken, and that you wished to appear very magnanimous where it could be of no service? You differed very much at that time from what you state to be the public opinion, when a few days after the examination you called me as I was passing you on King's Square, and stated that "you seen I had nothing to do with it." But having touched you a little on the raw, your vision is wonderfully improved—you have acquired a second sight, and outtravelling Joe Smith, the Mormon Prophet, you have had revealed to you barrels of Diamond Plates, and Butt Bolts innumerable, that had been stolen by others and purchased by me, which

never had been the case, only in your imagination, and not even there only for the occasion. You assume that I bought indiscriminately all sorts of iron from those boys, whose future fate you so pathetically described. You lie—under a mistake, Brother Heard. Such did not appear in evidence, neither is it true, which I am prepared if necessary to prove.

Your profile of the old Tax-gatherer bears as much resemblance to what you would wish to make it appear, as light does to darkness. I have not taken anything by false accusation; but from the way in which you swore to old rusty bolts having no marks, perhaps you have. The Bible Class that has you for a Teacher will be apt to realise the truth of the proverb of the blind leading the blind, &c.

As the public generally know little, and care less, about the affair, I should not now have troubled them, only for the threat held out by you. I am not aware that public justice is bound to wait the pleasure of William Heard, or any one else. I was prepared to meet you last Cou t on the indictments, and am so still. Take my advice, which is as good on this point as Mr. Howe's, or any other lawyer, when you bring it forward again have better evidence than you had in the last case. Yours, &c.,

LOCAL NEWS.

THE WHALE.—At the present time a novel spectacle, an enormous Whale—75 feet in length—is to be seen at the entrance of Tracadie harbor, it being one of the largest animals of which we have any certain information. The carcass was found floating at sea, and towed into the harbor on Monday, the 3d inst., and has become an interesting object. During the last ten days it has been visited by an immense concourse of people from every section of the Island, anxious to have the opportunity of seeing one of those mighty monsters of the deep, so rarely thrown on our shores. On Monday the writer proceeded to the spot, and gathered the following particulars from Mr. Oliver L. Gilman, who belongs to the vessel, and was landed to take charge and dispose of the carcass. Our informant states, that on Sunday, the 2d August, at noon, it was first sighted floating on the surface, by the American fishing schooner "Samuel Gilbert," of Gloucester, Mass., Henry Smith, master, when off about 20 or 25 miles from land. Bearing down directly towards the object, various conjectures were expressed as to what it really consisted of. Approaching it within about half a mile, it was discovered to be a dead whale—the tail and abdomen uppermost—floating about twenty feet high; and on nearing it the body presented one of the richest prizes that nature rarely awards to the humble fisherman. A hawser was easily fastened round the tail, and it was taken in tow—steering towards Tracadie at the rate of two miles an hour. In crossing the bar it grounded in 8 feet of water, where it stuck until the flow of the following tide, when it was towed inside of the harbor, next the sand-hills, near Mr. Fowl's new fishing establishment, and where it immediately became, and continues to be, an object of great curiosity. On reaching the beach, an enormous mass appears to the spectator—a carcass equal to 30 tons, or 120 fat oxen. The animal would, perhaps, be more interesting were it placed on its belly; but it floated with its back upwards, and rests in that position, surrounded with water intermixed with oil. The more unique features—such as the mouth, eyes, blow-holes, being underneath, are not visible. An animal of this size has lips nearly 20 feet long, and displays, when open, a cavity capable of receiving a jolly-boat and her crew. The head is disproportionately large—measuring about 20 feet, and forming about one-third of the entire bulk. This is a Greenland humbacked female, supposed to be in part with two large teeth at the lower part of the abdomen. The fins of the tail are flat, and placed longitudinally, and measures from the end about 25 feet across. The fins are one on each side—about nine feet in length. The color of the fins and tail are yellow-white; the tail being partly clouded as it terminates. The abdomen is black—being ribbed with large muscular bands passing longitudinally from the head to the tail, each band measuring about nine inches in width—at the present this outward covering is curling and peeling off from the effect of the sun, and beneath appears a solid fatty substance—the oil oozing out copiously from the whole surface, of a very strong odor, intermingling with the sea-water. The body looks like a large Indian canoe turned upside down. Several persons got on it, and were walking—or rather wading—on its surface every step. By putting the hand under water the mouth is reached; and it is covered with long stout bristles of whalebone, from eight to ten inches in length. We brought home several pieces of the outward skin, and a handful of these bristles.

The carcass of the whale has been purchased by Mr. Dean. One-half of the value is claimed by Messrs. J. P. Jewell, Tamworth, New Hampshire, the owners of the vessel. The residue is to be equally divided between each of the crew, consisting of 12 persons. Preparations were making for rendering the oil—dissection has already begun,—and the naturalist will be further gratified by paying another visitation as it progresses. Few anatomists can undertake to ascertain the conformation and figure of this great inhabitant of the deep, where the operators, instead of separating with a lancet, must cut their way with a broad-axe and hand-saw—!
