Crops In Prairies Suffer Set Back. OTTAWA, July 18 (CP)—Crops in the Prairie Provinces suffered a setback from a week of hot dry weather, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics said today in a report covering crop conditions in Canada.

High temperatures were reported from many points in the Prairies and crops dried heavily on moisture reserves. Reports of yellowing and tipping in early wheat were received from the southern part of the wheat belt.

Crop conditions in Eastern Canada have been well maintained during the past two weeks, the report said. Improvement in the Maritime Provinces has continued, and although the hay crop is light, other field crops including spring grains, potatoes and roots have made good progress.
