

Red Sox Down Senators; Spahn Scores 15th Win

Mighty Ted Williams cracked a home-measure homer and chipped in a two-run single Thursday as Boston Red Sox extended their unbeaten string to five games by defeating Washington Senators 8-4 in the only scheduled American League game.

A three-run seventh inning rally featured by Ted Mathew's 23rd home run gave Milwaukee a 3-2 lead over Pittsburgh and a 3-2 decision over the Braves' National League lead to 6 1/2 games.

The other National League game of the afternoon saw Los Angeles Dodgers defeat the Cubs 4-1 in Chicago.

TOWERING DRIVE
Williams, playing in his home park, picked the first pitch from Truman Cleveland with the bases empty in the seventh and sent a towering drive that carried more than 450 feet. It was his 20th homer of the season and No. 476 of his career.

The Red Sox cemented their win with three runs in each of the first two innings.

Home runs by Jim Lemon and Roy Washington were good for the four Washington runs as Red Sox pitcher Frank Sullivan pitched his ninth victory. The loss was charged to starter Hall Craggs.

GETS DECISION
Warren Spahn, like the Pirates' Bob Friend bidding for his 15th victory of the season, got the decision at Milwaukee. Friend had a two-hit shutout going into the fourth and seventh. Spahn, now 15-7, pitched seven.

But he was favorably impressed by some of the talent he viewed in the afternoon session and even more taken with the performances of Charlotteville Little Leaguers - 150 strong-in the morning. "Your youngsters," he said, "have as fine a potential, as any better, than any kids I've seen."

Jones was happy to hear that Vern Handrahan, a fastballing Charlotteville pitcher, had stuck with Stellarton Albions of the H.C. League. "I recommended Vern, Bobby Lund and Roger MacLeod to Truro, but I have since stopped off in Stellarton," Lund and MacLeod have since returned to the Island.

The Braves have a working agreement with Truro Bearcats. Several of their better prospects - all college boys - are playing there.

Jones' record of finding baseball players rich in talent is an impressive one. At least six pitchers now top flight hurlers in the majors, are his products.

On the Milwaukee staff alone there are four - rookie sensations Carlton Willey and Joey Jay, Juan Pizarro and Ernie Johnson. Matt Antonelli was signed by Jones to a big bonus with the old Boston Braves. Antonelli now is the ace of the San Francisco staff. Dick Donovan also inked a pact with the Boston team. After an up and down career Donovan came back to stay as one of the best in the league with Chicago White Sox.

The fourth ranked Miss Borland, who won the closed juvenile singles in 1955 and the closed girls' singles last year, will play first-seeded Sharon Caldwell of Toronto in Saturday's final.

Miss Caldwell, Ontario junior champion for two straight years, defeated Ottawa's Pat Ryan, third-seeded, 6-3, 6-2, in the other semi-final.
