

and during the hurry attendant upon a departure, accelerated some days earlier than I had prepared for it, the renewal of this wish was formally announced to me, by several gentlemen, to whom I again replied in the manner above stated; and seeing, immediately afterwards, successively, the Attorney General and the Chief Justice, I mentioned the circumstance to each of them, acquainting them also with my reasons. I was not informed with whom the suggestion originated. I have no reason to suppose it came from either of those gentlemen—nor do I know that they had even heard of it, until told by myself—though I have now the pleasure of knowing that I am honored by having their names upon the list. Immediately preceding my embarkation, several friends expressed to me sentiments of serious vexation, at my having declined what they said was meant in so much kindness, and so designed to testify to me personal respect, that it appeared like giving a disappointment to generous feelings, to reject the expression of them. I felt the force of this just remark so fully, that I judged it absolutely incumbent upon me to give some testimony of value for the honor designed, not only in token of gratitude, but as due in common courtesy. In my hurry, therefore, which continued without intermission from that period until my final embarkation for England, I wrote the hasty letter which has appeared, I understand, in one or both the gazettes at Prince Edward Island, without, at the time, recollecting how impossible it was that, upon a subject already known to several, or many persons, such a communication could remain entirely private; and to this fact, I presume, I may attribute its having been published without my authority—the explanation of which has not yet reached me, owing, I conclude, to the rapidity of my movements, by the prodigious celerity of the steam vessels, which almost precede their own promises, and outrun all pursuit. Had it not been for this oversight on my part, at the moment, or had I been aware that the sentiments towards me would have been so very generally expressed, as to include all the most distinguished names of the persons of highest consideration in the Island, and of the most various interests—thus obviating even the possibility, that by any mistake or misinterpretation it could be construed into an indication of political or party spirit or feeling, of any sort, but one of genuine kindness towards myself—I should certainly—though with some slight variation in the form of words—have myself requested the publication of my letter, since it was depriving me of half the great pleasure conferred upon me by those who had awakened my sense of gratitude, to deny myself the satisfaction and delight of making them a public acknowledgment of the feelings which penetrated my heart.

If, however, upon reading that letter, any of the subscribers to the address have wished to withdraw their names, I must feel they are at full liberty to do so, without giving me the least ground of offence; for, however proper might be my motives for the refusal, and however little designed to displease, still, if I did not choose to accept the compliment at the time, and in the manner it was at first proposed to me, I certainly can have no right to claim it afterwards in any other.

Having stated this, and not allowing the opportunity to pass without reiterating my cordial thanks to my many friends at Prince Edward Island—to which charming little territory my most affectionate wishes will always hereafter revert with the warmest solicitude—I shall now leave, confidingly, to those kind friends there to say for me whatever else may be proper or requisite, as I should not deem it becoming in me to enter upon the subject again myself.

We regret to state that the Bill passed last Session for the erection of a building for a Lunatic Asylum and other objects of charity, has been suspended by the Queen in Council, on the ground, that the appointment of the Trustees by the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, would be conferring executive powers on the Legislative bodies. The Bill for the appointment of Coroners in each of the Counties is rejected, because the appointment is in the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, whereas it is maintained that the appointment ought to have been in the hands of the Governor alone; and also, that no retiring allowance is provided for the officer at present in charge of that office. The Apprentice Act has also been disallowed, but upon what grounds we really confess ourselves unable to make out.

THE SEASON.—The New Brunswick and other papers speak in glowing terms of the beauty and mildness of the present season. We think we can match them. Can any of the neighbouring Colonies boast of butterflies in the month of November? We can anticipate the answer. We can, however, assure them that these beautiful creatures of the element, were seen flitting about here no later than yesterday, the thirteenth of November.

PLOUGHING MATCH, Lot 49.—On Thursday the 5th inst. a Ploughing Match, under the direction of the Independent Agricultural Society, took place in a field belonging to Mr. J. R. Bourke, Mill View, in the presence of a considerable number of spectators. Six ploughs were entered for competition, without limitation as to time. This being the first attempt at a ploughing match in that district, the work was on the whole but indifferently performed, and the ploughs generally in very bad order; but we have reason to anticipate, from the spirit of emulation excited, a much better exhibition next year, and a considerable addition to the number of competitors. The prizes were awarded as follows:—

First prize, 20s., James Macdonald, North Pole.
Second do. 15s., John M'Carthy, Lot 49.
Third do. 10s. Job Irving, Cherry Valley.—*Gaz.*

Mr. L. Maclaren, Surgeon, performed the operation of puncturing the membranes covering the brain of a child, 15 months old, for hydrocephalus, or water on the brain—from which 8½ gills, or 34 fluid ounces of water, were extracted. This is the first attempt we have heard of, being made in the British Colonies, to combat this almost universally fatal disease, by surgical treatment. The head is considerably diminished, and it is hoped that the child (a girl) will do well.—*Id.*
