WRAC Director is Named

LONDON, (CP)—Col. Mary Raitton, 47, will become the only brigadier in the Women's Royal Army Corps next September and the boss of 6,500 women.

The colonel with the crisp air of command succeeds retiring Dame Frances Coulshed, CBE, as director of the corps. Only the Princess Royal will then hold superior rank to the woman who started 15 years of service life in the voluntary, unpaid ranks of the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry. The Princess Royal, daughter of the late Queen Mary, is controller-commandant and a major-general.

Col Raitton joined the FANY in 1938, then transferred to the Army. She started her wartime career as a corporal driver and held a commission by 1940. Later she became senior commander of the Auxiliary Territorial Service group at Scottish command headquarters.

The ATS became the WRAC in 1949. Since last September Col Raitton has been deputy director at southern command.

Her new command will last just three years. Compulsory retirement comes at 50. Col. Raitton is a non-smoker, a moderate drinker with a taste for travelling, walking, music and theatre. For off-duty she likes casual country clothes. She is blue-eyed and five feet, seven inches tall.
