Hoop Gambling Scandal Erupts

NEW YORK, Jan. 18 — (AP)—A basketball gambling scandal erupted today with the disclosure of an attempt to fix Tuesday night's Manhattan-Duquesne College game and the arrest of two former Manhattan players accused of throwing games last season.

The players were Henry E. Poppe, 24, and John A. Byrnes, 22, co-captains of last season's team charged with taking bribes in the three college games.

Edward F. Breslin, assistant district attorney of the Bronx, said each received about \$5,000 in bribes. Byrnes played this season for Bridgeport in the American Professional Basketball League.

Also arrested as alleged "fixers" were Irving Schwartzberg, 36, his brother Benjamin, 35, and Cornelius Kelleher, 35. They and the two former players were charged with conspiracy and bribery.
