# Calgary's Suspend Fleming, Tremblay

**MONTREAL** (CP) — President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League today suspended without pay for three games Reg Fleming of Chicago Black Hawks and Gilles Tremblay of Montreal Canadiens for their stick-swinging duel during a game in Chicago last Tuesday.

The suspension will apply to the next three games between Chicago and Montreal. The first was Saturday night when Chicago won 2-1. Montreal's next is here Nov. 10 and the third is Chicago Nov. 16.

Campbell said that the automatic fines of \$100 each incurred in the incident will stand against each player.

Campbell conducted the hearing at the NHL offices with the two players present, along with Referee Frank Uhl, manager of the Montreal Canadiens, Canadian manager Tom Ivan of Black Hawks and coach Toe Blake of Montreal.

Campbell said "it is acknowledged by all parties that Tremblay took the first swing in the duel, striking Fleming's stick and breaking off the blade of his own."
