

Spain's Perilous Position.

A RICH BUT UNDEVELOPED COUNTRY.

A New York Herald correspondent in Paris interviewed Mr. Palmer, United States Minister to Spain. Mr. Palmer was asked what his views were on the political situation in Spain and said: "I think the Queen Regent a most excellent woman, disposed to administer the affairs of state on the broadest and most liberal basis. Still there is no denying that the Republican current is running strong in the country, and if the baby king should die, or if Portugal should follow the example of Brazil, no one can tell what may happen. One of the worst features in Spain's present economy is the lack of home production. Almost everything is imported. The consequences are that wages are low and the cost of living high. Nor is there any reason for this state of affairs, inasmuch as the country possesses most excellent natural products. Here is a chance for enterprising men to step in and make a fortune for themselves."

The State of the Coast.

A special despatch to the Halifax Herald, from North Sydney, C. B., dated April 30, says: The str. Sicilian from Palermo reports having passed through about twenty miles of light ice moving rapidly southward. She steamed through the ice at half speed without any trouble. The str. Eagle, Captain Jackman, from St. John's reports having left the icefields and taking seals for St. John's on the 21st, arrived there laden with 10,000 seals. She then prepared for her trip for this port for seals, and arrived here on the 28th. The captain reports about 20 miles of light scattered ice in the gulf, but nothing to hinder shipping or impede navigation. The general impression is that the strip of ice reported is the last we shall have this spring. The sailing vessels have found it difficult to reach here via Scattara, while shipping coming through St. Peter's canal and Big Bras d'Or have had no detention.

News Notes.

The recent statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows an increase in specie of over 22,796,000 marks.

Reports from western and south-western Texas say reasonable rains have fallen and crop prospects are the most encouraging of any for years.

The latest story from Berlin is that it was the ex-Express Frederick, who discomfited Bismarck and brought about the Chancellor's downfall. This seems to show that woman's suffrage is not an essential to a woman who knows how to rule.

Chauncey M. Depew, who has just returned from an extended visit to the South says that he strongly advocated the formation of a government system of savings banks in the South. "The negro will not trust any individual with his money, and has little confidence in anything but Government institutions. Give him government savings banks, educate him to the fact that he must work six days a week, and save a part of what he earns. If this is done, the Southern race question will rapidly work out its own solution."

The British Columbian Government last week introduced in the legislature a Redistribution Bill, which proposes to increase the number of representatives by six, making the total membership 33. The island and the mainland are each given three additional members, but the people of Vancouver, New Westminster, and the New Westminster district are highly indignant at the small consideration shown them. Their representation, they claim, is not only wholly disproportionate to that of the island cities, but positively ridiculous when compared with that of the interior. Their 6,546 voters are given only six representatives, while the 1,278 who live east of the Cascades are accorded eleven. The Vancouver News-Advertiser says that the result of the passage of the bill will be new party lines in the next Legislature. The New Westminster Columbian says also that there is not the slightest doubt of the measure being carried, but that "this quarrel shall drink blood another day."

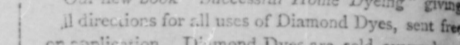
