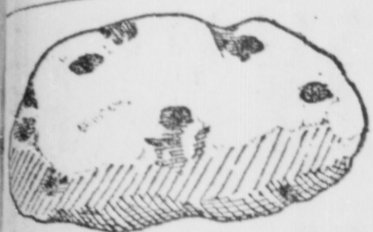

O'CONNELL'S DAY AT EMERALD

A Large Attendance and a Good Time Enjoyed by All.

The O'Connell celebration at Emerald yesterday was a distinct success. The attendance was large notwithstanding the fact that a great many were busily engaged hay-making, and the day passed most pleasantly. The dinner table was richly and abundantly supplied, and a similar remark applies to the tea table. All the tables were well conducted. The other attractions usual on such occasions were also in abundance. When the Charlottetown contingent of the Benevolent Irish Society arrived at Emerald they were met by the local members, and the whole Society, headed by the fine band of the League of the Cross, marched to the Hall where an eloquent address of welcome was delivered by Mr. P. J. Trainor. After the address resolutions of condolence passed by the Emerald branch on the death of the late John Hughes, suitably proposed by Mr. Peter McCourt, and seconded by Mr. D. O'M. Reddin, jr. and Mr. W. J. O'Reilly, were adopted by the Charlottetown society. After this meeting the members repaired to the picnic grounds.

At half-past three o'clock the oration was delivered from the band stand. Mr. P. McCourt, President of the Benevolent Irish Society, presided, and introduced the orator, Mr. John L. Carleton, barrister-at-law, of St. John, N. B., in a fitting speech. Mr. Carleton's subject was "The Day We Celebrate," and the discourse throughout was eloquent and impressive. The next speaker, Mr. James J. Johnston, barrister-at-law, proposed a vote of thanks in a speech eulogistic of the oration and the subject thereof. The motion was seconded by Mr. D. O'M. Reddin, jr. and supported by Mr. W. J. O'Reilly, and Mr. Peter Duffy of Emerald.

The chairman read a highly interesting letter received from a venerable and patriotic lady of Summerside, Mrs. Ann Gorman, mother of the late Thomas P. Gorman. The letter was accompanied by a poem on "O'Connell," and was received with loud applause. Mrs. Gorman, who is in her 82nd year, heard the Liberator speak on "Catholic Emancipation" in Dublin in 1825, and in her letter she heartily commended the celebration in honor of her illustrious countryman.

The literary programme concluded the remainder of the evening was passed in social intercourse and the festivities which always absorb the time and attention of the young folk on such occasions.
