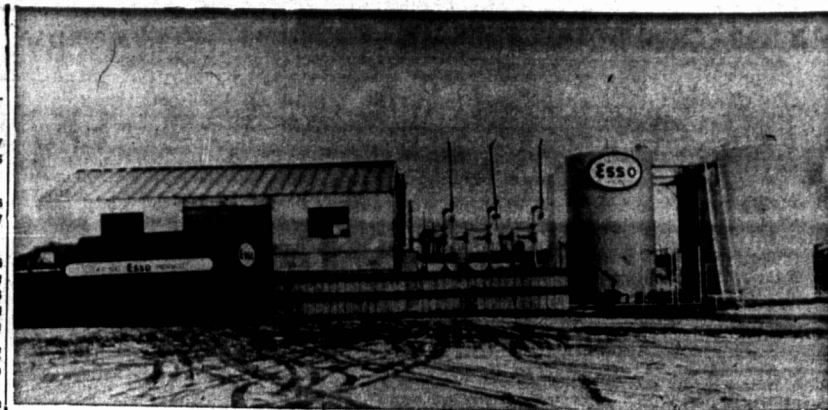
Ship Loading At Georgetown

To Study Quoddy Fishery Effects

PORTLAND, Me. (AP)—A study will be started soon by biologists to determine whether construction of the proposed Passamaquoddy tidal power project will affect fisheries in the area. U.S. and Canadian biologists of the International Commission for North Atlantic Fisheries ended a four-day conference here Thursday. The Quoddy study will be made by experts from the Atlantic biological station at St. Andrews, N.B., and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service laboratory at Woods Hole, Mass. ANGLO AMERICAN RELATIONS

I want to come now, if I may, to the question of Anglo-American relations. The effect of these events upon Anglo-American relations has been much discussed. I do not think it profitable to talk in detail about the past. There have been differences of opinion, and I can assure the House that neither country thinks it is the only one which believes it has cause for complaint. There have been differences in the past and I think that it would be idle to attempt to disguise that fact. But I believe that what we now have to consider is the future, and upon what basis we can seek to cooperate in the Middle East. I think that the difference of opinion with regard to action in the Middle East were very well known to many members of the administration on that side of the Atlantic. As I say, I do not think it profitable to seek to recriminate—I do not think that that is the right word. What I think is much more important is to see if we can create an effective basis for working together in the future. I do not believe that an acute difference necessarily makes it more difficult to associate together in the future. It may do a great deal to clear the air, and make possible closer alliance in the future. But the point is upon what basis should we seek to co-operate? I would remind the House of what the United States Government has said regarding the Baghdad pact: "The United States reaffirms its support for the collective efforts of those nations—that is, the Baghdad countries: "To maintain their independence. A threat to the territorial integrity or political independence of the members would be viewed by the United States with the utmost gravity."

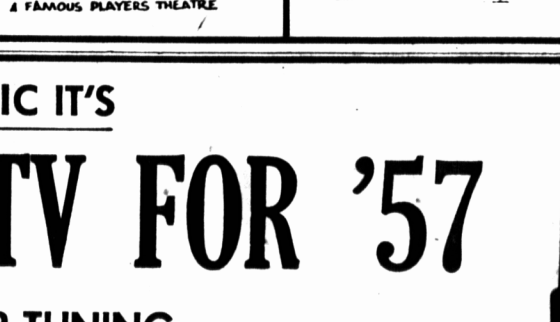
