Southpaw Wilf Shepherd scattered seven hits in notching his victory. He walked five and fanned four.

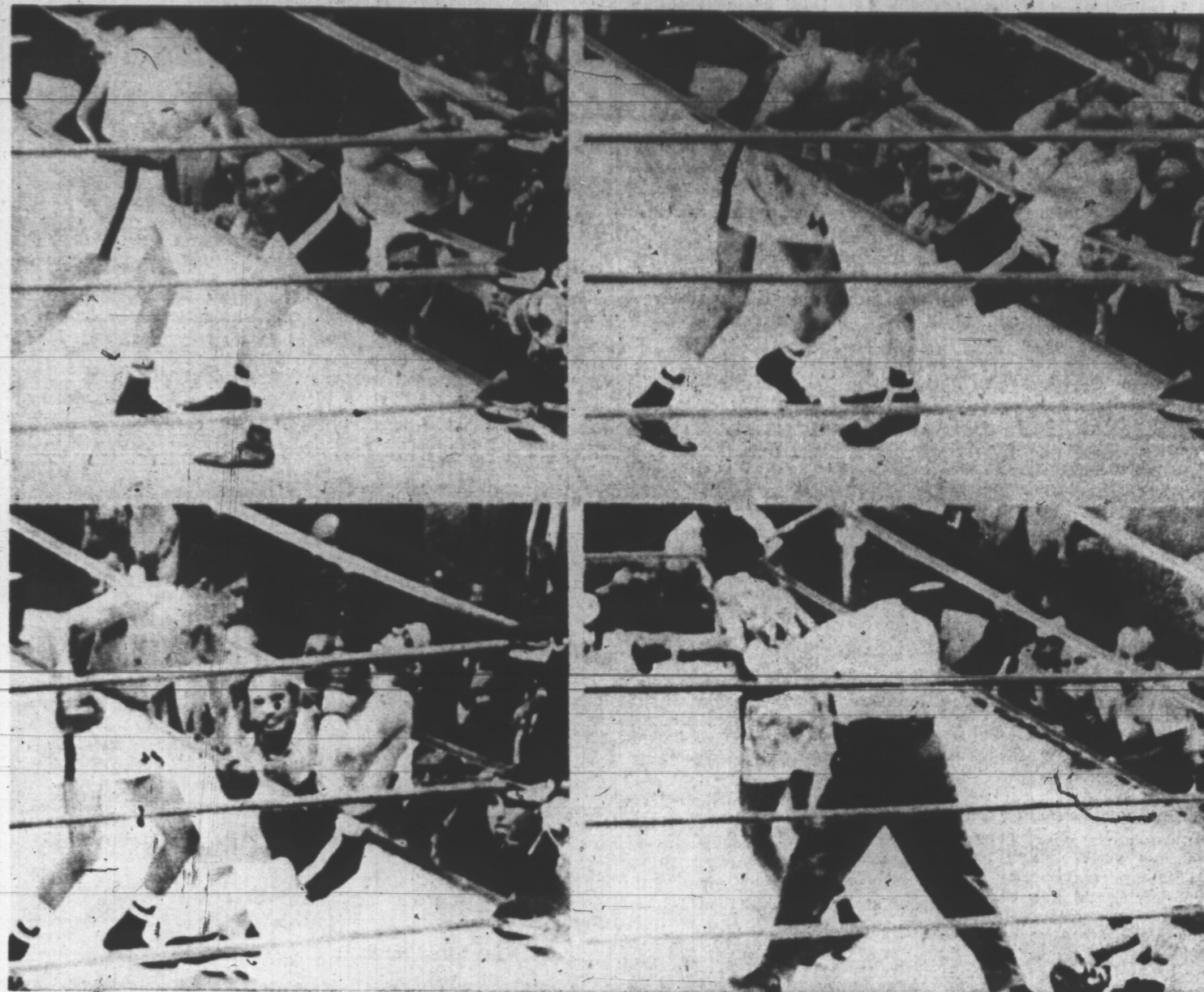
For the Irish it was Joe Thistle toiling on the mound. Thistle was tagged for eleven hits, walking one and fanning three. His teammates committed three miscues.

NEW YORK YANKEES have had it. At least that's our thoughts on the subject and we feel fairly confident that we are going to be right this time.

That series with Boston Red Sox was a real nightmare to Casey Stengel and his band and we figure it was the final blow that crushed the hopes of New York to repeat as league champions.

Yankee pitching and batting both fell apart in the recent series and the result of it all is that the Bombers are just about out of contention.

Sure, there's still time to overhaul the pacesetters but the type of team the Yankees have this season doesn't impress this columnist as one that will catch up with either Cleveland or Chicago.

The White Sox and the Indians are right full of ambition this year and they appear like the two teams to battle right down the homelane for the league flag.

This time those Yankee looks like mere onlookers.

"SEEMS LIKE OLD TIMES..." goes a popular tune of some years ago. This pretty well summed up the situation at Peakes on Sunday where the hometown Bombers inflicted the first defeat of the season on the young Mount Stewart entry in the Kings County Baseball League. It was like old times in more ways than one for it was also the first time this season that Peakes had the chance to play on their new diamond. The Bombers lost their old field early in the season and have been a wandering band of baseballers ever since.

The Bombers treated their local fandom with a sparkling display in trimming the hitherto unbeaten squad from Mt. Stewart. It was a decisive 13-7 triumph before one of the largest crowds of the season. Considering that Mount Stewart has previously walloped every other entry in the Kings loop and in addition soundly trounced both Charlottetown Junior Leams - the Legionaires and Abbies - it would seem that Peakes will be a power to be considered when the blue chips are laid on the line in the fall.

Tommy Dunphy supplied a good deal of the Bomber punch by slugging a homer and a pair of singles in five official trips.

THE OTHER TWO GAMES played in the loop were a lot closer and more indicative of the competition being served up this year by the teams. St. Peter's Rovers rammed out 15 hits, but barely staggered to a 14-12 victory over Morell. In the third game Georgetown had to come from behind to grab an 8-7 victory. The Eagles knocked the count in the sixth on the strength of a three-run homer and went on to win in the final frame.

THE OTHER DAY Rocky Marciano, plump and healthy, said ex-heavy weight champion Floyd Patterson has a "fair chance" of winning back the crown from Ingemar Johansson in their return bout next September.

Said the Rock: "I don't know how much that beating took out of Floyd. I hope he's not gunshy. He's a hard trainer and in the next couple of months they'll be able to tell about him from his workout performances. I think he's got an even chance."

But the former champ, now 34 who retired undefeated in 1956, also had a word of warning for Patterson. "He's just got to watch Johansson's right," said the champ.

CASTING a critical eye in the Swede's direction Marciano observed that the new title holder hasn't got much other than a boxing right hand but conceded that he's hard to hit. He has that funny European style and stands straight up. He dances backwards. Johansson showed he's alert, a thinking fighter and has good reflexes. And he is stronger and bigger than Patterson." He added, "But everyone knows Patterson is a better fighter."

Marciano discredited reports that he is planning a comeback of his own. "Rumors started after my appearance at the title fight that I was thinking of coming back, but my plans haven't changed. Everything is going good and God willing, I'll do pretty good as I am. I'm retired and I plan to stay that way."

W. Germany's Top Hurdler Claims World Mark Tues.

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) - They call him the "American from Cologne."

Nobody knows exactly why Martin Lauer, West Germany's stellar hurdler got this name but his friends explain it this way: "Martin is an all-round athlete. He is calm, self-controlled and cool in and out of competition. He races only for the fun of it. He likes American jazz music and is a very good drummer and guitar player."

WORLD RECORD

Tuesday night in Zurich, Switzerland, Lauer won the 110-metre hurdle race in 1:56.4, bettering his own mark by two-tenths of a second.

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Cliff Lumsdon Captures Atlantic City Marathon

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) - Cliff Lumsdon of New Toronto Monday won the sixth annual Atlantic City distance swim by about 75 yards over defending champion and three-time winner Tom Park of Bellflower, Calif.

Lumsdon swam the 25 miles in 10 hours, 54 minutes and five seconds to regain the crown he won in 1956 when he beat Park, a native of Hamilton, Ont., by a stroke.

Lumsdon swam up to the finish line at the Atlantic City State Marina Boat Club to the cheers of hundreds of spectators, sounds of numerous foghorns and the music of a band.

Park followed him to the finish line with a time of 11 hours and 15 seconds.

POSES FOR PICTURES

Lumsdon, clad in plaid trunks, posed for pictures in a terry cloth robe after emerging from the water. The 28-year-old swimmer looked exhausted after leaving the 70-degree water.

Park told reporters that he became caught in the tide near the end of the arduous swim and "I never could quite get back."

Relatives and friends of both Park and Lumsdon as well as the other swimmers waited at the Marina and cheered the other competitors on.

THIRD TO FINISH

Third to finish and the first woman was former Danish swim star Greta Andersen of Long Beach, Calif., who covered the distance in 11 hours, seven minutes and 25 seconds.

One entrant, Miss Phyllis Clarke, 27, of Kingston, Ont., was pulled from the water after seven hours and doctors said she had become paralyzed from the

waist down. She was taken to Atlantic City Hospital with what doctors said was an apparent sprain of the sacro-lumbar or the sacroiliac.

Bosox Whip Yankees 13-3 To Cop 5 Game Series

Boston Red Sox erupted for a mammoth nine-run sixth inning—four of them on Gene Stephens' grand slam homer—and went on to blast slumping New York Yankees 13-3 Monday.

It was Boston's fifth straight decision over the Yankees, the first time the Red Sox had swept a five-game series from the New Yorkers since 1930. The loss dropped Casey Stengel's world

champions into fifth place, two tenths of a percentage point behind Detroit.

Stephens, inserted a pinch runner for Ted Williams early in the sixth, stroked a 2-1 offering by Jim Bronstad into the right field seat as the 11th Red Sox to go to bat in the inning.

That wrapped up a wild, weird exhibition started by Jackie Jensen's double off the centrefield wall.

THE BIG INNING

Boston's biggest inning of the year also included such oddities as two singles by Frank Malzone, and Sammy White ambling in from third base unmolested when Yankee first baseman Elston Howard held the ball and turned to protest a ruling by first base umpire Nestor Chylak.

Jensen, the American League's most valuable player last year, continued his lousy hitting against the Yankees. He got things started with a three-run homer in the first inning, drove in another run when he was walked with the three trips. That gave him 10 hits in 19 trips in the five-game series and 10 runs batted in.

Big Frank Sullivan went the distance for the Red Sox victory, Boston's seventh in eight starts. Sullivan, a six-foot-seven right-hander, allowed 10 hits, struck out seven and walked only two in picking up his sixth victory against five losses.

He was in trouble only in the first inning when Yogi Berra clouted his 10th homer of the year with Tony Kubek on ahead of him, giving the Yankees a 2-0 lead.

LAST YANK RUN

The Yankees got to him for another run in the eighth, on a double by Norm Siebern. Gil McDougald's single and a sacrifice fly by Bobby Richardson.

By that time, however, the Red Sox, on the strength of their sixth inning explosion, were out of reach.

After Jensen doubled, Williams singled him in, then took second on the throw. Malzone singled. Hector Lopez caught Stephens, running for Williams, at the plate when he trapped Vic Wertz' hard

smash. Sullivan singled off McDougald's foot, scoring Malzone. Don Buddin beat out an infield single, and when Howard turned his back to the plate to protest the call, White trotted in.

Pete Runnes doubled in a run, and a hit batter and a fielder's choice loaded the bases for Stephens' smash.

Don Larson, now 6-4, the first of five Yankee pitchers, was the loser. A crowd of 22,064 sat through the three hour, nine minute game.
