**CENTRES OF SALMON**  
One favored fall fashion in food is stuffed vegetables. Marrow, eggplant, squash, green peppers — all make flavorful and inexpensive main dishes when filled and baked with a savory mixture. The Fisheries Council of Canada suggests Salmon-Filled Peppers as sure-fire conquerors of the increased appetites that nippy September air encourages. Canned salmon, zesty seasonings, and cooked rice are blended together with colorful tomato sauce to

make an appetite-appealing main course when used as a filling for vivid green peppers, a good recipe to try during National Fish Week.

**SALMON-FILLED PEPPERS**  
2 cups canned salmon  
1-3 cup minced onion  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
Dash of Tabasco sauce  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 1/4 cups peeled rice

Or" he added on another thought "be inveigled into buying something we don't need one bit in the world — like a TV set or "he chuckled at the absurdity of it on this much-wooded farm" a pop-up toaster!"

Granddaughter giggled. She and her grandfather are in complete understanding on most subjects.

"So I'll improve my time at home," he continued "It needs a new trow in that first sty in the piggery. We've been waiting for days to get around to building one. I'll tinker away at that" he smiled, "and she can pick her own hat!"

1 small can tomato sauce (app. 1 cup)  
4 large green peppers, washed  
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine  
1/4 cup soft enriched bread crumbs  
Saute onion in butter until soft. Add 1/2 onion, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco sauce, salt, pepper, rice and tomato sauce; heat through. Meanwhile cut a thin slice from stem end of each pepper; remove seeds. Simmer peppers in boiling water for five minutes. Drain; sprinkle insides with salt. Fill with salmon mixture. Combine bread crumbs and melted butter. Use to top stuffed pepper. Place crumb side up in covered greased baking dish. Bake in moderately hot oven preheated to 375 deg. F., for 20 minutes, then remove cover and bake another ten minutes. Makes 4 servings.

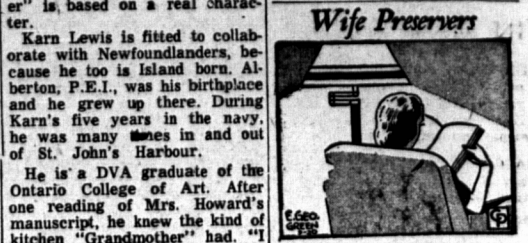
