### Business and the Markets

BUSINESS is dull. There are too many in it, and the season all through has been most unfavorable. But the prospect is improving. Orders are in some demand for the lumbering provinces and the British market at 34 cents per bushel. Several ships are loading for the Old Country. But farmers are just now too busy to bring along their grain. A good many eggs are being sent to the English market, and the demand is improving. Some of our dealers are shipping all their eggs for England by the Furness Line, of which Mr. W. W. Clarke is agent here, and others are going into it more largely than ever. It is pleasing to learn that the quality of our eggs, on arrival in England, is reported excellent, and that there are enquiries for more. Potatoes remain a complete drug everywhere. The nominal prices here are 18 to 20 cents per bushel.

The Chignecto Post last week instituted a comparison between the neighboring provincial market and that of Boston. It says that the figures for Moncton are those given in the Transcript of Monday last. The Boston prices are those quoted by the Official Market Report of the Boston Chamber of Commerce on May 5th. The qualities are equal in every case.

It will be seen that, with the exception of eggs and mutton, everything quoted by our contemporary, and by the Boston dealer brings a higher price in Moncton than in the market which the Liberals offer to the farmers. The highest price quoted for butter in Boston is 22 cents for small boxes of extra creamy butter of Franklin Co., Mass. The Sackville creamery butter sold for 25 cents in St. John last fall. As the Post remarks, these figures speak for themselves and our farmer friends can form their own conclusions.

### The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.)  
HALIFAX, May 19.  
Anticosti—At South-west Point salmon are good, lance fair, and a few lobsters; but owing to the strong north-east winds little is being done.  
Quebec—Salmon fair at Gaspe; lobsters and herring good at Newport Point; fair at Grand River, but poor at Percé; at Carquet good catches of herring and fair of lobsters are being made, while at Deschamps the catch of herring is reported fair.  
New Brunswick—At Point Escurie lobsters are reported good, herring fair.  
P. E. Island—At Malpeque the catch of lobsters has been good; herring fair. At Georgetown lobsters are fair, herring poor.  
Cape Breton—Herring are very plentiful in Bras d'Or Lake, and a few herring and lobsters at Port Hood, Ingonish and St. Ann's. Lobsters are fair at Port Hecatebury, but poor at Louisburg, West Arichat and St. Peter's. Cod and gaspareux fair at Port Hood, and a few cod at Ingonish and Louisburg. Haddock are reported at St. Peter's, but few have been taken yet.  
Nova Scotia—Codfish good to-day at Port Medway, fair at Musquidobit harbor, and a few cod and lobsters at Canoe. Spry Bay and Pubnico boats arriving at Canoe from the banks report poor catches, owing to stormy weather, lobsters fair at Blue Rocks, Lewis Island and Rose Bay, while at Isaac's Harbor, Musquidobit harbor and Port Medway the catch has been light. Gaspareux very plentiful at Port Medway, good at Musquidobit harbor and poor at Pubnico.

Lord Dufferin, who is always interesting and often witty, has been making a new suggestion. He was addressing the British Chamber of Commerce in Paris the other day and referred to the blessings of peace and the wisdom of maintaining it. "In former days," said the new Ambassador to France, "a declaration of war was conveyed with great ceremony by heralds of the King and trumpeters. Modern times it is conveyed in a curt and often ungrammatical telegram. Now, my idea would be to erect two lofty gibbets on the frontier, and with due pomp and decorum have the two Ambassadors of the respective countries strung up, and if the instrument were further embellished by the presence of the two Foreign Ministers, the lesson would be all the more striking." This is pretty hard on the diplomats, who certainly do not cause all the wars, though doubtless they might prevent more than they do.

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

#### The Belfast Steamer.

SIR.—I beg to ask the owners of the M. A. Starr if it is their intention to have her call at China Point Wharf this summer? So far she has almost failed to do so. Whether the fault rests with the company or the fellow in charge of the boat, no person knows. Be this as it may, the people of China Point and vicinity have grown heartily tired of the humbug and neglect of the steamer on the route between Charlottetown and Orwell—nor can they long endure the insolent and overbearing conduct of a self-conceited ignoramus who is clothed for the time being with a little authority, but steels against the mellowing influence of civilization.

CHIEFTAIN.

SIR.—I take the liberty of trespassing on your valuable space for the purpose of protesting against the treatment which is inflicted upon the people of this vicinity in the matter of communication with Charlottetown. Our communication with the Capital was, up to the time of the loss of the steamer Heather Belfast, generally all satisfactory to the public. Since then the service has been performed by an antiquated collier in no way fitted for the service. On account of her great draught of water, she is unable to reach the wharf except at high tide, thus necessitating the conveying of passengers in boats, a circumstance attended with the utmost discomfort and inconvenience, and even danger, especially to lady passengers. By way of accommodation a couple of small, cold and cheerless saloons reached by steep and dangerous ladders, and all thickly coated with last year's filth—such accommodation as might have been provided for a band of slaves in the days of their hardest servitude. But such treatment is quite in keeping with that which Belfast always received from Grit rulers. Such are the fruits Belfasters have invariably gathered from the baneful tree of Gritism. Ever since we were cruelly sold by the architect who now so fitly presides over the organ of the Star Chamber Government in P. E. Island, and who, not satisfied with cheating us of the railway, foisted upon us an old hulk of a boat ("The Maid of the Mist") subsidized by the Grit Government, of which he was then a member, not for the purpose of bettering the service, but with a view to running the route whether and more suitable route whose great fault was that she was largely owned by a political opponent; since then, I say, till the present, communication with Belfast has been hampered under Grit rule, and the partisan spirit which prompted the running of the Maid of the Mist is the same which now allows on this route the M. A. Starr, to the great annoyance of the travelling public in this section of the country, for the Inland Steam Navigation Company's tender was not the lowest, nor the company likely to give any better service, yet it is largely composed of the "faithful" and consequently must be pampered, petted and pleased. In view of all this we naturally ask what are our representatives doing, or for what purpose do these worthless think they were elected? Where is the dashing young politician whose fiery soul was burning with indignation, and a zeal not to be quenched, as he dilated upon the wrongs and grievances of his loved native district at the last general election. Has he forgot all the bright promises he then made? And what of the glowing pictures of prosperity which he then painted as a result of the triumph of Gritism? Too often alas! has the heroism of the field been laid aside for the sensual pleasures of the court, and our quondam hero now basks in the sunshine of his own splendor and sips the ephemeral sweets of worldly pleasure, an employment more gratifying and less arduous than looking after the interests of his constituents. And where is the staid old statesman who represents us as the council board, whose sole claim to the position he occupies seems to be his unlimited capacity for saying nothing, and the sublime silence of whose political existence is broken only by an occasional "aye," given in response to the bidding of the autocrat whom accident has made leader of a government in this Province? Is he, in common with his colleagues, so completely inflated with his own grandeur as to regard the grievances of common Belfasters too petty for notice? It would have been much more to his credit had he attended to the wants of the district he represents instead of wasting his time in the vain attempt to frame a constitution for the perpetuation of Grit rule in defiance of all known principles of British Government.

—The recommendations of the Canadian Civil Service Commission embrace: First the appointment of a permanent Civil Service Commission whose duty it will be to test the fitness for office of candidates, for appointment or promotion, to any office or position in the civil service, with full power to enquire into and report upon the state and management of public business and the official conduct of public servants; secondly the adoption of the English principle of appointment by open competition, that age limit at which a person may enter the service be twenty-five, instead of thirty-five, and that no office be created without the sanction of Parliament; thirdly that the maximum salary of Deputy Hand be increased from \$4,000 to \$5,000, and that the maximum salary of first-class clerks to be hereafter appointed be \$1,600 instead of \$1,300; of second-class clerks, \$1,300 instead of \$1,000; and third-class clerks, \$800 instead of \$1,000.

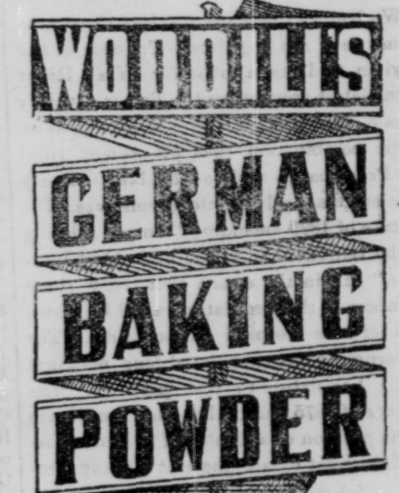
