MONDAY

A very large congregation was present at Trinity United Church last evening when Rev. J. T. Irwin, associate minister, preached his farewell sermon.

Rev. Mr. Irwin emphasized the need of nations, groups and individuals recognizing Christ as the cohesive power in the centre of their lives.

Killed almost immediately in the accident were his wife, Mrs. Trainor, and their son, Carl.

WEDNESDAY

One of the most successful annual meetings ever held was reported by the Canadian Medical Association which recently concluded its gathering in Winnipeg with over 2,000 doctors and their wives present.

Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, of this city, was in attendance and was re-elected to the executive and is one of the oldest members of the Association in years of service. Also present from this city were Dr. John Maloney and Dr. Temple Hooper. Reports indicated that over 9,000 doctors were paid up members of the Association.

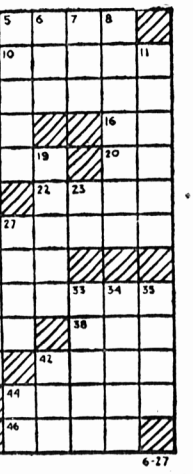
DAILY CRYPTOQUOTE

Members of the Church of Scotland in Charlottetown took the first step yesterday afternoon towards the erection of a suitable place of worship on a plot of land recently acquired by church officials on Birchwood Street, just off Longworth Avenue.

The honour of turning the first sod was accorded to Mrs. Maria Mutow, who, bordering on the age of 90 years is the oldest member of the congregation.

The brief but impressive ceremony was conducted by Rev. J. H. Bishop, minister of the Church of Scotland, assisted by Rev. Allister Johnson, representing the Free Church of Scotland, in the presence of a representative number of the members of the congregation.
