John Clark of Sackville, N.B. was elected vice-president, the new directors being: E.T. Goring Nappan N.S. J.L. Garey St. John N.B.; J.E. Mill-

gan Truro N.S. Lloyd Horton Moncton, N.B.; Ian Rankin and George Whiteside, both of Charlottetown.

Among the highlights of the meeting was the unanimous opinion of the speakers that the use of limestone on most of our Maritime soils not only greatly increases yields, but also makes fertilizers much more available and profitable. Speakers included M. Cannon and D. Reid of Charlottetown, who presented progress reports on pesticides with fertilizers, and W.N. Black, of the local Illustration Station who participated in a panel discussion on the subject "Does it Pay to use Fertilizers."

The meeting ended with a banquet attended by Premier Matheson, Hon. Eugene Cullen, R. Pelletier Superintendent of the Experimental Farm at St. Anne de la Pocatiere, P.Q. was a guest speaker.

### Egypt Not Ruled From Washington

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt (Reuters) President Nasser Friday night told a wildly-cheering crowd that the

Egyptian people will see to it Egypt is ruled "from Cairo and not from Washington."  
In a speech on the first anniversary of the nationalization of the Suez Canal, the Egyptian leader declared: "Dollars will not buy Arab nationalism." The huge crowd roared approval.  
Egypt's foreign policy is impartially between the Eastern and Western blocs, he said. "We shall not favor one camp or the other." The Egyptian leader complained that the American press and "imperialist" radio broadcasts are carrying on a "war of hate and war of nerves" against Egypt.
