Runnels, Davis Lead Major Batting Races

NEW YORK (AP)—Pete Runnels of Boston has virtually won the American League batting championship and Tommy Davis of Los Angeles leads the National League lead in the batting race.

Runnels batted in competition. But he took other hits in the important hitting categories. He is still up for grabs.

With only three weeks remaining in the regular 1962 campaign, Tommy Davis leads the National League batting parade by only a single point over Frank Robinson's 1962 Willie Mays of San Francisco has a four homer lead over Aaron of Milwaukee. He is the senior circuit; Harmon Killebrew of Minnesota leads Los Angeles' Lee Harvey in the American League home run race and Norm Siebern of Kansas City holds a two RBI lead over Killebrew.

Dupas, of New Orleans, has won 53 of his 114 fights. Curvis has lost only one of 25.

HAMILTON (CP)—The Grey Cup, championship of the Blue Bombers swept to their sixth straight victory as the defeated Hamilton Tiger-Cats 16-10 Monday night in a fiercely fought Canadian Football League game before a sell-out crowd of 26,363.

For the Tiger-Cats, whom the Bombers beat 21-14 in overtime in the Grey Cup final last year, the loss was their first in five games and left them in second place in the Eastern Conference standings.

The Bombers, who now have won six games against one defeat, strengthened their grip on first place in the Western Conference. They lead the second-place Calgary Stampeders by five points.

The Tiger-Cats, with three wins, a tie and a loss, trail the Eastern Conference Ottawa Rough Riders, by a single point but the Riders, with four wins and two losses, have played one more game.

The Bombers fought strenuously from behind to defeat the Tiger-Cats in a game that had the crowd roaring over some rulings by the officials. The Bombers' deciding touchdown came on the first play of the fourth quarter and from then on they held off the desperate Tiger-Cats by their tough, hard-hitting defence.

Winnipeg took a 4-0 first-quarter lead but Tiger-Cats struck down and a field goal in the second quarter to go ahead 10-0 by halftime. The Bombers closed the gap to 10-3 in the third-quarter with a field goal and a single and then went ahead again 15-10 on a converted touchdown at 25 seconds ended a single point late in the quarter.
