

# Ottawa Breezes To Victory Over Alouettes

 OTTAWA (CP) — Ottawa's Rough Riders breezed to a 27-0 victory over the defenceless Montreal Alouettes Saturday before 18,214 yawning fans in the Eastern Football Conference sudden-death semi-final.

## Seven Killed In USAF Crash

DOVER, Del. (AP)—Seven crew members of a U.S. Air Force C-130 cargo carrier were killed Saturday when the plane crashed and bursted shortly after take-off from Goose Bay Air Force Base, Labrador.

The four-engine cargo plane, based at Dover Air Force Base was heading for Sondrestrom, Greenland, when it crashed wing first in a wooded area about a mile from the runway.

Maj. Gall Steele, public information officer at Dover reported.

Light snow was reported falling at the time of the crash. An investigation into the cause of the crash was under way.

Steele identified the dead crew members, all of whom lived in the Dover area, as:

 REGINA (CP)—A passing attack that produced four touchdowns in the last quarter gave Saskatchewan a 19-0 victory over Calgary Stampeders Saturday in the first game of the Western Football Conference semi-final play-off series.
