

Sales Of Color TV Sets Ahead Of Color Programs

Prospects for selling color television sets in Canada appear brighter than any time that will appear on the picture tube.

Although Canadian TV networks won't be getting into color transmissions until 1967, increasing use of color by United States channels picked up in popular border cities is offering a chance for the industry to jump ahead, officials predict.

In fact some say, supply may not be able to keep up with demand for a while.

The industry admits sales have a long way to go. There are only about 8,500 color sets in Canada now, compared with almost 5,000,000 black-and-white units.

Next year, however, officials are forecasting sales of 8,500 and 17,000 in 1967. There will be 100,000 color sets in Canadian homes by 1970, one official says hopefully.

In dollars, this would mean \$13,500,000 by 1967 and \$50,000,000 in 1970.

Capital Punishment Concept Is Attacked

MONTREAL (CP) — Jean Pinatel, French criminologist who is general secretary of the International Society for Criminology, attacked the concept of capital punishment.

Mr. Pinatel, speaking at a press conference on the opening day of the international criminological conference here, said the present concept of a deterrent value is not valid. The criminal does not, in general, feel fear, and does not believe the threat of retribution applied to him.

"To reach a certain negative sort of effect," he said later in an interview, "all murderers would have to be subjected to the death sentence."

By this, he said, he meant that all murderers, even those who now escape arrest or whose sentences are commuted for "various social reasons" would have to be executed.

"To get maximum value from the supposed deterrent, he said, one would also have to make executions public, 'reinstate the hood, the bare feet, the noose and the walk on air.'"

"But we can't return to the middle ages. And to institute over-all application of death sentences would be a sort of genocide."

The treatment of criminals must be humanized, he said, food improved, capital punishment eliminated and sentences made less severe.

However, he said, habitual criminals and occasional ones can not be treated in the same manner.

The congress, he said, "is an extremely important event as it is being held in Montreal at a time when the (Canadian) governments envisage reforms in the Criminal Code and in the whole penal system."

The congress was opened Monday before more than 1,000 of the 1,500 delegates from some 40 countries by Governor-General Georges Vanier and Mme. Vanier.

Planners Of Atlantic Union Should Note CLC Method

MONTCTON (CP) — President Claude Jodoin of the Canadian Labor Congress said here people of the Atlantic region may take a lesson from the CLC when considering the proposed political union of the region.

Mr. Jodoin, here to address the New Brunswick Labor Federation's annual convention, told a press conference that the Canadian Labor Congress has divided Canada into five regions, one of which is the Atlantic provinces.

He said that if this is a practical resolution of geographic problems for a national organization the size of the CLC, it might be the answer to regional political organization. However, he said, the matter of Atlantic union is "up to the people themselves to decide."

CALLS FOR MEDICARE

Mr. Jodoin said the greatest problem which must be tackled in the years ahead lies in the realm of social legislation. He urged government action for a national medical and health program.

The labor leader called for collective bargaining rights for civil servants, including the right to strike.

He said it is up to the individual union affiliated with the CLC to determine whether it wishes to become associated with any political party. But, he said, the CLC reserves the right to criticize any political party.
