Mr. Carpenter, a CPR engineer on the Belleville and Havelock subdivisions, brought Toronto to Ottawa passenger train No. 34 to a stop at the station here to end 44 years of faithful service with the Canadian Pacific Railway. He was presented with a gold wrist watch during a social evening held at the home of his son, Burt. Mrs. Carpenter received a corsage from the large gathering. Mr. Carpenter entered service with the CPR as a fireman on October 21, 1915, at McAdam, N.B. He transferred to Smith Falls a year later and was classed as an engineer in 1921. ## Growing Demand Is Shown For Fur Of Wild Animals

EDMONTON (CP)—A greater number of Canada's wild animals will find their furs on women's backs if people in the fur industry have their way. Demand for wild furs has been declining for some time because of increasing varieties of ranch mink which make up roughly 70 per cent of the value of the fur trade. The trend this year is back to the original standard dark brown mink, and toward the wild mink as well as such wild furs as white fox, lynx and otter. This was indicated at recent fur auction sales. William Levine, manager of Edmonton Fur Auction Sales Limited, says people in the fur industry are seeking a greater variety of furs to place on the market. They are therefore trying to give the wild fur industry a "shot in the arm" as well as encourage the stability of the fur rancher. The original wild-brown mink has been transformed over the years through cross-breeding on fur farms into a variety of new shades—pastels, greys, sapphires, buffs and whites. But the fur rancher apparently is running out of new shades, and the fur industry looks toward the trapper to provide the varieties of furs to meet the customers' demand. The success of the ranch mink tended to force down prices of wild furs, and in the last four or five years demand for wild furs declined severely. The number of white trappers, responsible for practically all the wild furs in the last 25 years, declined by about two-thirds. The fur industry therefore decided to encourage the trapper by offering better prices. Mr. Levine said wild mink this year brought a top price of \$50 a pelt, about 25 per cent above last year's top price. Higher prices were also paid for white fox, lynx and otter furs. Buyers from Canadian, United States and European markets paid top prices of \$38 for white fox, about 20 per cent higher than last year, and \$25 for lynx, about 10 per cent above last year's price. Buyers meanwhile paid a top price of \$36 for the standard dark variety of ranch mink. This was about 35 per cent above last year's return. The standard dark variety has become scarce and now makes up about 20 per cent of ranch mink. Pastels were up 10 per cent, returning a top price of \$28, but sapphires and whites were down between 25 and 35 per cent from last year.
