Little Delay Experienced At Emergency Care Centre

REGINA (AP)—In the main corridor of Regina General Hospital a long row of chairs lined up with a single "emergency room" sign. Patients sit for a while, enter the emergency room, explain their ailments and then are routed to the proper department for treatment. The number of waiting patients varies from one or two to a dozen, but there is never much delay.

Other patients are brought in by stretcher or wheelchair and rushed directly to a doctor.

The Regina hospital is one of the 35 emergency centres in Saskatchewan where doctors are providing free medical service during the medical care boycott.

Eight to 10 volunteer doctors are serving at the Regina hospital in the province, but it also operates the largest emergency centre.

Aided by diversities The smaller emergency centres have only one or two doctors. While some doctors are serving outside these centres, many areas have no other medical service except that offered by the centres. Sometimes it is necessary to travel 100 miles or more by car or air ambulance to reach a hospital with doctors on duty.

At the Regina hospital, this reporter talked to a score of waiting patients and found only one from outside Regina. She had come 100 miles by automobile for treatment of complications resulting from an operation performed before the doctors' strike started.

One man had been hurt while water skiing, he thought he had some broken ribs. A mother brought a three-year old daughter who had hurt her arm. Another mother was there with a little boy who had an injury from the holiday week.

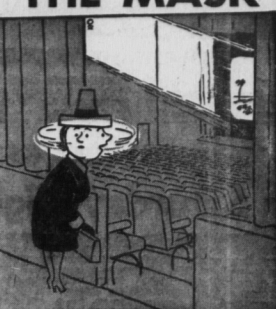
One of the surprising things to hospital officials is the relatively small number of emergency cases. The Regina hospital has 740 beds, with a normal occupancy of 650. During the past week, however, the average occupancy has been only 350.

The high number of outpatients treated on any one day was 220, with a low of 151 Sunday. This represents a substantial increase over the normal outpatient volume of 20 to 25 cases a day.

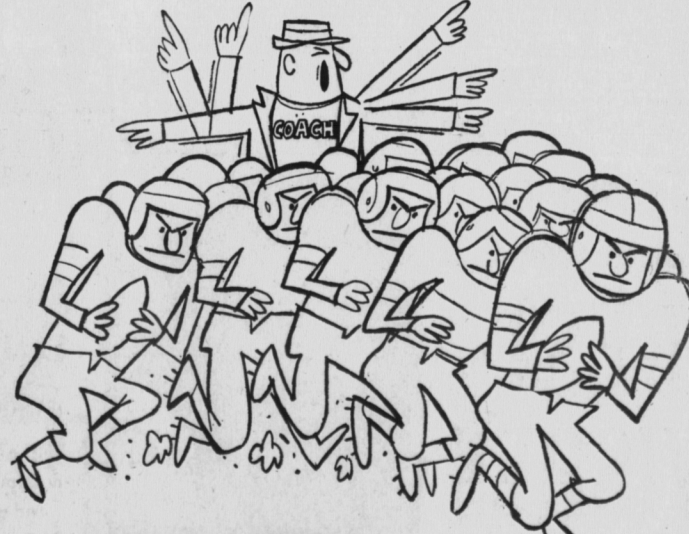
