While trying the speed of a running horse belonging to Mr. Clow, the animal at the height of speed jumped over the side of a bridge. Both horse and driver upset in the stream, and Mr. Brown received a very ugly wound in the right side of the head, as well as a serious injury to his left leg. He is, we understand doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances, and will be able to attend to business at the end of the week... FIRE—On Sunday afternoon, at three o'clock, a fire broke out in an outhouse owned by Rev. Mr. McDonald, situated in the rear of his residence on Upper Hillsborough Street. Before the alarm was given, the flames had taken possession of the building, and ere the engine commenced work it was almost buried to the ground. As the debris blazed up, the house on the east side, owned by Messrs. Stiggins and Hendry, ran a narrow escape, and was only saved by a number of energetic citizens who kept water buckets constantly at work until the steam engine commenced to play. The rear of Mr. McDonald's house was badly scorched, while a porch on Messrs. Stiggins and Hendry's dwelling was largely burned... EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION.—The annual meeting of the above Association will be held at Charlottetown, on Thursday and Friday, the 13th and 14th instant. The following programme of exercises has been arranged:— Thursday, 13th inst., morning session—Miss J. McNeil, Summerside, will read a paper on "The Teacher's Work: Its Responsibilities." Afternoon session—D. Gallant, Esq., Rustico, will read a paper on "The Acadia Schools; P. R. Rogers, Esq., a public meeting will be held in the evening. Friday, 14th inst., morning session—Miss Eliza Lawson, Charlottetown, will read a paper on "How to make School Work pleasant; Prof. A. Anderson, Charlottetown. Afternoon session—H. Lawson, Esq., Charlottetown, Prof. T. A. LePage, Charlottetown, will read a paper entitled "Hard Work." An interesting feature of the proceedings will be the teaching of classes by several of the teachers present... THE scarcity of water at the fire yesterday day was the cause of general comment. The tank at the head of Hillsborough street was empty, the supply in the pumps in that vicinity was very small, and in order to obtain a sufficient quantity of water to quench the fire Silby engine had to take a position at Lea's factory and pumped into the tank at King's Square, from which "Rolls" engine drew sufficient to extinguish the flames. In order to perform this work the firemen had to use every available length of hose, and pump the water up a high grade. Had the fire, yesterday, occurred in a closely built block, and had a strong wind prevailed, the northern portion, the city would be destroyed before water could be obtained to stay the progress of the fire. This being the case, who is to blame? TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30. The Garfield fund to-day amounts to \$333,795.99.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.

The State Department has received the following:—

On reaching Montana, we hear with sorrow that our hopes are ended by the death of James A. Garfield, which all Canada will deplore with you.

LORNE.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Sept. 30.

Chas. Parmenter, aged 55, foreman of the printing department at the National Armory in this city, was crushed this forenoon while attempting to step through a large wheel between the spokes while painting the wheel. He had just ordered it started when he undertook to step through. He only lived five minutes.

LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 30.

All three robbers who captured and robbed the train on the Iron Mountain Road last Thursday night, and who have since been vigorously pursued, were captured on Wednesday—one near Sulphur Bluff, Hampton County, Texas, and two in Indian Nation. All three were brought to Hope last night, jailed and fully identified.

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.

Various points in the northwest report the wind storm widespread and very disastrous. It seems to have lasted all day. The wires being down in many places, full reports of its ravages have not yet been obtained.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Sept. 30.

Father Sheehy, speaking at Kilmallock yesterday, said he had come out of prison with the same spirit as he had entered it.

Mr. Hargan, a farmer, while returning to Ballyclogan, after assisting in saving Boycotted crops, was shot and dangerously wounded.

Specials from Dublin show that the explosion at Lloyd's house at Pallao was malicious, as a fuse was found attached to a barrel of powder.

The Land League has issued circulars to the secretaries of leagues throughout the country, requesting them to send details of any cases of local holders who, since the passage of the Act of 1870, have been compelled by landlords, by threats of eviction, or undue influence, to take out leases containing unfair conditions toward the holders.

DUBLIN, Sept. 30.

Communications are reaching the Land Commissioners from all parts of the country, almost entirely from tenants, asking to have their rents fixed.

LONDON, Sept. 30.

The Lancet condemns the attending surgeons for making the best of Garfield's case in their bulletins, and says a bulletin should be the truth and nothing but the truth.

LONDON, Sept. 30.

The British barque Gertrude, Capt. Dunn, from Quebec, August 19th, for Belfast, is ashore in Dundrum Bay in the Irish Sea. The vessel has filled and will probably become a total wreck. The crew were saved.

CANADIAN.

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 30.

The steambot Elizabeth J. Irving took fire at Fort Hope, Fraser River, this afternoon and was totally consumed. She had on board the mails, eighty passengers and a full cargo. All the white passengers are thought to have been saved, but a number of Indians are supposed to have been lost. The boat cost \$8,000.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 30.

An earthquake has occurred at Changersy in Anatolia, in which eleven persons have been killed. The grand mosque and numerous dwellings were greatly injured.

The Governor of Tripoli has notified the Porte that the agitation is increasing on the Tunisian and Algerian frontiers, and that the Tunisian Arabs intend to force the military cordon and enter Tripolitan territory.

St. PETERSBURG, Sept. 30.

An indictment against four nihilists who had been in prison 18 months, has been completed. Their trial will commence in a few days and will be held with closed doors. One of them, Marie Krylera, is a gentlewoman, was implicated in Karakosoff's attempt to assassinate the late Czar in 1866. The immediate charge against all is the secret printing of revolutionary papers.

EMPORIA, Sept. 30.

The long drought was broken here yesterday by one of the heaviest rain storms ever seen in this section. Streets were literally flooded in half an hour, and ravines ran like rivers. After this storm subsided another arose, which soon turned to a violent and destructive cyclone. It seemed to have started a few miles west of this city and travelled in a northwesterly direction, leaving Emporia several miles from the track. In this city there are now lying four dead bodies of people killed by its fury. A score of buildings were utterly demolished. The loss of property is very great and a large number of people have been injured by falling stones and flying timbers.

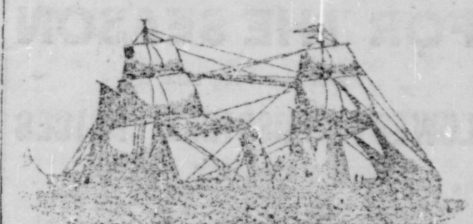
