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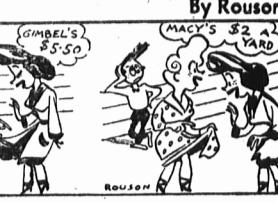
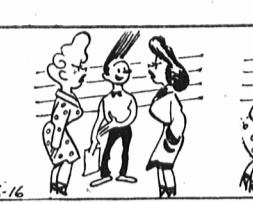
The Kensington Bantams eked out a 7-6 win over the City Bantam Royals in an exhibition baseball game played at Memorial Field Saturday afternoon.

N. Y. Yankees Defeat Cleveland Twice Sunday To Strengthen Top Spot

(By The Canadian Press)
 The fast-moving New York Yankees, winners in 13 of 15 games this month, defeated Cleveland Indians twice Sunday, 5-2 and 4-3, to strengthen their grip on first place in the American League.

Boston Red Sox divided a doubleheader with Chicago White Sox, dropping the opener 7-2 but capturing the nightcap 3-2. The split, along with Cleveland's double setback, gave the Sox a one-game edge over the Indians in second place, 1½ games back of the Yankees. Chicago is fourth, 4½ games off the pace.

Brooklyn's National League lead was shaved to 3½ games as Cincinnati downed the Dodgers 7-4 while the second-place New York Giants divided a pair with St. Louis Cardinals. In the first game, the Giants blew an 11-run lead and lost 4-12. But they blanked the Cards 3-0 in the second.

Chicago Cubs' pennant drive stalled as they lost a doubleheader to Boston Braves 4-1 and 2-0. Pittsburgh Pirates racked up a 6-0 triumph over Philadelphia Phillies in the first game of a twin bill but the Phillies took the second 6-3.

In other American League action, St. Louis Browns won their first doubleheader of the season, 6-3 and 7-6 in 11 innings over Philadelphia Athletics. Detroit Tigers divided a pair with Washington Senators, winning the opener 6-3 but dropping the nightcap 4-2.

Southpaw Eddie Lopat won the opener for the Yankees over Cleveland, against Bob Lemon. Lemon was shelled for six runs in a second-inning rally capped by Mickey Mantle's three-run homer. Bob

Unknown Wins U. S. Golf Open

 DALLAS, Tex., June 15—(AP)—Ben Hogan's golf dynasty crumbled Saturday and a North Carolina apprentice professional, Julius Boros, came scrambling out of nowhere to win the 52nd national open championship with a 72-hole score of 281.

The unheralded Boros, 32, of Southern Pines, N. C., won with a four-stroke margin over chubby Ed Oliver of Lemont, Ill., who sank a 30-foot birdie putt on the final green to beat out Hogan for second place by a stroke.

Oliver had a tournament total of 285 while Hogan finished with 286. Playing like a man of destiny, the 200-pound Boros collared the great three-time champion Hogan with a blazing two-under-par 68 in the morning and then hung on firmly by shooting a 71 in the final round.

Hogan weakened under the blistering Texas sun and soared to rounds of 74 and 74 after a pair of sparkling 69s. He was a tired old man of 39 when he trudged to the 22nd green—his hopes of a record four straight championships shattered when kinks developed in his iron game.

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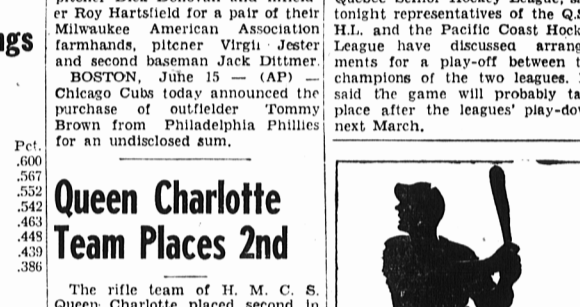

Scientific Giant to Probe Unexplored Universe



A STAIRWAY TO THE STARS is the world's largest radio telescope, pictured above as an artist's impression, to be built at Jodrell Bank, England, for Manchester University. Its aerial will be 250 feet in diameter and the axis on which it will turn to various parts of the skies will have a height of 185 feet. Combining the techniques of the radar and radio, probing through clouds that surround the earth, radio astronomy has made great strides since the last war. The new giant will cost the equivalent of \$40,000 to build and will weigh over 1,270 tons when finished.
