

Wage Scale On P.E.I. Said National Disgrace

In Prince Edward Island, the average wage is only 60 per cent of the national average, and is a little less than 50 per cent of the Ontario level.

Addressing the annual meeting of the International Association of Personnel in Employment Security (Atlantic Chapter) Joseph O'Connell, professor of Economics at St. Dunstan's University, said that the wage levels on Prince Edward Island are not only a provincial embarrassment—they are a national disgrace.

To develop Canada to its fullest potential there cannot be an unbalanced situation with rich provinces and poor provinces. The people in the Atlantic area cannot continue to be "the hewers of wood and the drawers of water", but all areas must participate in the national wealth in such a way that serious disparities do not develop, he said.

Programs for the Atlantic area to improve the skill of the labor force are praiseworthy and necessary, but these will be of small value to the Atlantic region if opportunities to use the newly acquired skills are lacking.

13 Forest Fires Burning In N.S.

The forest fire situation in Nova Scotia Monday reached its most serious level so far this season with 13 blazes in central and eastern sections of the province.

A forestry official at Shubenacadie near Truro called the situation "very serious." Strong winds with no prospects for rain was forecast for today.

A fire west of Grand Lake and about 25 miles north of Halifax was giving trouble for the third consecutive day. The fire was confined Sunday after burning over a four by 1 1/2-mile area of prime spruce and hardwood, but erupted with new vigor Monday.

A water bombing plane and continuous shifts of firefighters were being used to battle the Grand Lake blaze. The fire reached its limit on one side Monday when it approached the lake. In some areas it was burning rapidly.

Four new fires erupted Monday in Halifax County and two in Cape Breton. Two had been brought under control by dusk.

The fire warning index was extreme in the counties of Halifax, Colchester, Pictou, Antigonish, Hants and Guysborough. All other areas had a high reading.

Nova Scotia last year lost about 800,000 of its 9,500,000 acres of forest through fire.

Museum Opens In Town; Private Project In Barn

ALBERTON — Lanrest Museum at Alberton was open to invited guests yesterday and will be open to the public during the summer months, beginning the first of July.

This new centre of interest in the town is the project of Mrs. W. R. Oulton.

Last year Mrs. Oulton decided to open a small handcraft gift shop in conjunction with her tourist home and located it in a part of the unused barn where her father-in-law had once kept his horse and cow. To add to

the interest of her shop, Mrs. Oulton placed a few antique rugs on a shelf above the counter. A few friends made contributions of other antique dishes.

Eventually one of these friends said to her "why don't you open up the rest of the barn and start a museum?"

Through the long winter months there was time for thought and planning and this spring there has been a lot of work.

STUDENTS HELP OUT

Allan MacRae and Owen Oliver, two high school students heard rumors of a museum, and were sufficiently interested to walk up to Mrs. Oulton to see what was being done and to volunteer their help. For the past two weeks Allan has been there every day and Owen has come as often as he could. Their assistance has been invaluable.

Mrs. Oulton says:

The barn has been arranged in rooms for which a surprising number of furnishings have been assembled in a short time. Through time their number will be increased.

Of interest in the living room area are table and chairs of a type not found in modern homes, a hand burner and a Franklin stove. On the table is a stereoscope such as was to be seen on every parlor table a couple of generations ago, and which brought more wonder and delight to children of that day than television does to boys and girls of today.

No oil burning stove or electric washer is to be found in the kitchen. In their place are an old wood-burning stove with high oven, a wash tub and board. There is the washstand with enamel basin, a clothes horse, a sofa, a clock that tells the date as well as the time, a kerosene lamp, crocks such as grandmother (or great grandmother) used for jam and for molasses or vinegar, butter prints etc.

Spanish Jesuit To Head Order

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Very Rev. Pedro Arrupe, a Spanish Jesuit physician who survived the Hiroshima atomic bomb, was elected Jesuit general Saturday.

Father Arrupe, 57, who has spent almost 30 years in Japan, rushed to treat victims of the holocaust in 1945 that ushered in the nuclear age. Saturday he took over Roman Catholicism's biggest and most influential religious order as it seeks to adjust to the church renewal launched in this nuclear era by the Vatican ecumenical council.

Father Arrupe was chosen on the third ballot during a secret conclave of 213 Jesuit electors from around the world.

The shy, white-haired priest is known as a skillful administrator who is admired among younger members of the 36,000-man Society of Jesus.

Pope Paul gave his approval and blessing when word of the choice was hurried to the papal apartment.

BORN IN SPAIN

Father Arrupe, who comes from the Basque region of Spain where the 16th-century Jesuit founder, St. Ignatius Loyola, was born, succeeds Rev. Jean Baptiste Janssens, The Belgian was elected general in 1946 and died last October at the age of 74.

Father Arrupe, 28th general of the Jesuits and the sixth Spaniard to hold that position, has served as a missionary and church leader in Japan since 1938. He was ordained in 1936.
