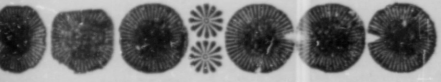

THE MAILS.—It is probable that the mails will be transferred to the Steam Navigation Company's steamers on Monday.

POLICE COURT.—Lawrence Hennessy, for being drunk and disorderly, was this morning fined \$8 or 40 days. The Liquor Regulation summons against John Jay was dismissed.

THE STANLEY will proceed to Pictou on Monday to load for the Magdalene Islands. She will leave Pictou on the 18th and will call at Souris and Georgetown on her way to the Islands.

THE MINTO.—The Minto's outward cargo this morning consisted of 24 pkgs seed, 139 cases eggs, 32 pkgs pork, 50 bags oats, 14 quarters beef, 9 pigs, 8 horses and 17 sheep. Her inward freight last evening was made up of 745 pkgs of sundries.

P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—Mrs. James McLeod sincerely thanks John Nicholls, Esq., of Annandale, King's County, for his handsome gift of one hundred dollars. This sum is intended to be expended by the furnishing committee in memory of his late lamented wife.

THE ISLAND STEAMERS.—The Princess arrived from Pictou this forenoon, bringing a good freight and several passengers. She left on return at the usual time this afternoon.

The Northumberland is making daily return trips between Summerside and Point du Chene.

MILITARY FUNERAL.—The body of Private William Macdonald was brought to the Island last evening by the Minto. It was met at the wharf by Colonel Moore, Major Stewart and Lieut. Shaw, the latter of Private McDonald's company. The remains were immediately taken to his home in Covehead, where they will be consigned to the grave to-day with military honors.

REMOVAL CONTEMPLATED.—Mr. Simon Bolger, who for several years has conducted the Rankin House, on the corner of Water and Pownall Streets, will, in a few days, remove to a more central location on Richmond street, near the London House Corner. Mr. Bolger will continue the hotel business at the new stand, and will, in the future as in the past, do everything he can for the benefit of those who patronize him.

INQUEST LAST NIGHT.—An inquest in view of the body of Thomas Cavanagh was held last evening before Coroner McLeod and a jury. Dr. Conroy, who made the post mortem examination, and John Yeo, the driver of the engine, gave evidence. The jury, after a short deliberation, returned a verdict to the effect that Cavanagh's death was caused by his being struck on the head by an engine while asleep on the track; the railway officials being exonerated from responsibility. The jury gave their fees to the family of the deceased.

AN IMPORTANT ARREST.—Evangeliste Joly, painter and decorator, has been arrested in Montreal charged with being the author of three mysterious burglaries committed at the station of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Joliette, Que. The first burglary took place in 1895, when \$6,000 was abstracted from the safe. A year later \$3,500 was taken and the station building burned. In August, 1899, the station was robbed a third time and \$7,000 stolen. Not a clue was left behind, but in the money stolen in the third burglary there was a bundle of Dominion one dollar notes which had come straight from the receiver general and of which the numbers had been preserved. A circular was sent out giving these numbers and a clue finally found, which being worked up, resulted in Joly's arrest. The officers claim to have found incriminating evidence. Joly's residence was well equipped with table covers and a rifle, while on his person was a big revolver and a clasp knife.
