PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

The Premier's Honor Tested

A Promise Deliberately Broken.

BELFAST-MURRAY HARBOR RAILWAY NOT ASSURED.

Government Has Not Decided to Begin It Next Spring.

OTTAWA, March 3.—In the House of Commons, on Tuesday last, at the request of Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Wilfrid Laurier promised to bring down a copy of the despatch to Lord Strathcona in answer to which Lord Strathcona stated that Mr. Hamilton Smith was not connected with the Rothschilds.

Yesterday Sir Charles reminded Sir Wilfrid that he had not produced the message, when the Premier made the surprising statement that his cable to Strathcona was private and confidential, and could not be brought down!

Sir Charles Tupper, astonished, asked Sir Wilfrid Laurier if he considered it honorable to break a pledge.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied, with heat, that he was the guardian of his own honor.

A discussion ensued, in the course of which strong language was used.

In reference to the manner in which Sir Wilfrid Laurier guarded his alleged honor, Sir Charles Tupper referred to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's previous pledge-breaking, and observed that his latest performance had broken even his record.

Hon. Mr. Blair told Mr. Martin that the preliminary survey of the proposed railway from Southport to Murray Harbor was completed. It was thought that the road would cost nine thousand dollars per mile. The government had not, Mr. Blair said, decided to commence construction next spring.

Hon. Mr. Blair also stated that the Federal government was negotiating with the P. E. Island government as to the proportion of cost each should bear of the construction of the proposed Hillsborough Bridge.

I. C. R. Will Not Cut Rates.

OTTAWA, March 3.—Hon. Mr. Blair says that the Intercolonial Railway will not go into the rate-cutting war.

THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

Government Majority is Only 3, and May be Cut Down to 0.

THE PREMIER TRIES TO STRENGTHEN HIS POSITION.

Hon. Mr. Harty's Election Protested.

TORONTO, March 3.—There are no new developments in regard to the elections.

Hon. Mr. Harty is waiting until he finds out how he stands; but in the meantime he has sent a man East to look after ex-Speaker Ewart, member elect for Prescott, who is said to be wavering in his political faith, and also to see that Russell votes right in the election shortly to be held.

The present position of the parties is: Liberals, 48; Conservatives, 43; Patron, 1; Independent, 1.

The independent is a Conservative, and so is the Patron,—so that the Liberal majority is only 3,—a little too narrow to do business on.

Hon. Mr. Harty will probably go in with a makeshift Cabinet for some time, as with the present narrow majority he dare not ask any of his followers to resign and open seats for the two defeated cabinet ministers, Dryden and Gibson.

Hon. Mr. Harty's election in Kingston is to be protested, and the arrest of one man on a charge of impersonating has already been decided upon.

Mr. St. John, the defeated Conservative candidate in West York, claims that he has been elected and will surely be so declared on a recount.

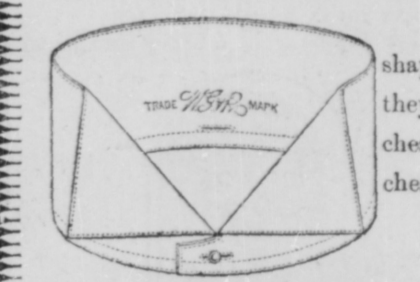
