Practical New Plastics

We just don't know how we ever got along without plastics. For example, we started checking up on plastic articles around the house the other day and just about gave it up.

But it did remind us of oilcloth, probably the first plastic that the homemaker had. It was certainly the first spill-proof, washable-on-the-spot table covering of all time. But it had its limitations.

PLIABLE MATERIAL. The plastic industry has kept perfecting the concept of this practical, pliable material until today you can buy, by the yard, a table cover that not only covers your table and cleans easily but also looks like any desirable woven material you may name: handloomed tweed, seersucker, straw, gay printed linen, leather. Whatever type strikes your fancy is available in vinyl plastic.

What's more, textured surfaces now have a special finish that gives them a light waxy sheen and a light wiping with a sudsy sponge and marvel that anything so easy to clean can also be so good-looking.

TERRIFIC JOB. Plastics can be used for everything from place mats to upholstery and are doing a terrific job as wall-covering, too.

If you want to change a tired-looking old room into an inviting new one, start with the walls. Giving walls a new look can transform a room probably more effectively than any other one thing.

We are all learning to use more imagination in our home decorating, getting away from the tried and true and experimenting a bit, after doing plenty of looking, thinking and consulting with the experts.

NOVEL AND EXCITING. Wall coverings are fast becoming more exciting, more novel, more decorative and certainly more varied, year by year. There are handsome wall tiles

that can be applied without professional help. One of the most exciting that we have seen is a vinyl plastic that looks like cork. These tiles come packaged in three shade variations—light medium and dark. The back of each tile is wetted and then pressed into place. The final effect is truly luxurious. The cork surface is very rich-looking and distinctive.

EASY TO CLEAN. And it's so easy to keep clean. Fingerprints, splattered foods and drinks and ordinary soil can be removed simply by washing the tiles with soap or detergent suds and water.

The tiles, which resist scratches and scuff marks, have also been classified as fire-resistant, according to Federal specifications. Examining these new tile coverings for walls carefully if you are in the process of doing over a room and want something out of the ordinary. You'll find them interesting and most provocative of new ideas about the home.

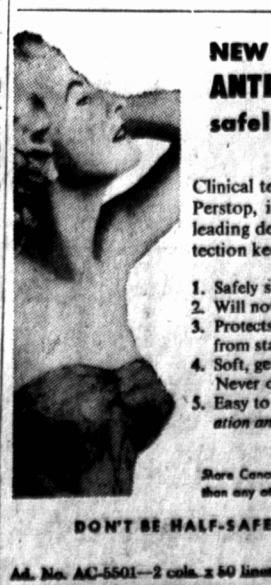

KEEP IN TRIM

New Diet Gives Late Afternoon Energy Boost

The really rough spot in the day for most dieters is late afternoon. You feel content with slimming fare until about four or 4:30 when suddenly a let-down feeling sets in. Some of you report that in the late afternoon you feel all-gone, almost sick, in fact.

There is a scientific explanation for late day fatigue—lowered blood sugar is the cause. When lunch is light, four or five hours later blood sugar tends to drop to an abnormally low level. It is then that a snack can save the day for the dieter. This "purposeful piece-meal" is scientifically sound.

Any food helps to raise the blood sugar. A sweet would raise the blood sugar promptly, but as sugar drops rapidly. Since starch calories burn more slowly than sugar, a slice of bread, buttered lightly, makes a good afternoon tea pick-up. Actually, a protein food provides the most sustaining pick-up since protein stays by you longer.

He showed a collection of suits, dresses and gowns at Victoria, Edmonton, Saskatoon and Winnipeg. Canadian women can order models displayed at the end of a show and have them flown from Britain within a month—made to measure.

The designer, who believes in making clothes to flatter female curves, is advocating the "soft and feminine" look for next spring. "There'll be more longer draped and straight skirts. I'm staying off the flared type." Materials favored will be pastel shepherd plaids and flower patterns on a dark background.

SALVAGE SHIPS EN ROUTE

HAMBURG (AP)—Two of the world's largest salvage ships, the Energetic and the Arctic, set off Monday for Port Said to help clear the Suez Canal. The 4,500-ton ships, each equipped with giant cranes and other repair devices, were taken under tow. The trip to the Suez was expected to take about 20 days.

Odor As Well As Colour Is Factor

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Odor—its presence or absence—is big business in the United States and is getting bigger. For example: Used car dealers spray their re-tread jalopies with "new car" fragrance.

Record companies issue albums with inside jackets dosed with a heady fragrance. Printing inks have been perfumed to give authentic aroma to ads and direct mail literature, with travel folders smelling like pine or pineapple and other odors of faraway places.

A perfume manufacturer uses fragrant cheques to promote business, and a bakery wants its cheques to have a fresh-baked bread smell for the same reason. Perfumes are sprayed on wear-

ing apparel and the boxes they come in, or dumped into air conditioners, elevators and waiting rooms.

To prove how "nosy" salesmen know what they're doing a department store conducted a test with two piles of identical hosiery selling at identical prices. The stockings whose boxes had a delicate perfume outshined the plain ones by a wide margin.

The manufacturer of a clothes drier discovered sales boomed when the stale "weekly wash" smell was removed from their machines by a simple de-smelling device.

An estimated two dozen firms in the United States do nothing but compound these fragrances and flavor bases. Hundreds of others do the same thing as a sideline.
