The question of how to deal with various card combinations in a suit has been well covered in textbooks on the play of the cards.
But some card combinations arise so infrequently they ordinarily are not covered in bridge books, and the student of the game must consult his own ingenuity to find the proper answer.
Here is a case where South had to work out the best way to play the heart suit. He won the club lead in dummy and led the seven of trump. East followed with the four and the contract now hinges on what South did. It is of course easy to see, look-

ing at the opponents' cards that the queen is the winning play. But the question is what is the right play if the opponents' cards are not known. How such problems are solved is our subject today.
Since a spade trick must be lost in any case, it is essential that only two trump tricks be lost if the contract is to be made. Therefore, when East plays the four, all hands where three trump tricks must be lost regardless of what declarer does are dismissed from consideration.
Also, all hands where the defenders' hearts are divided 2-2 are not important, since only two trump tricks will be lost regardless of which heart South plays from his hand.
The only case where declarer's play can matter is when West has one heart and East three. West's assumed singleton can be only the ace, king, or jack. Since three trump losers cannot be avoided if West's singleton is either the ace or king, the only way the contract can be made is if the singleton is the jack. Therefore, South should play the queen.
It is interesting to note that if dummy has one of declarer's low hearts, an entirely new problem is created. It would then be proper to finesse against the jack, because there would be twice as much chance to find West with either the singleton ace or king as the jack.

BRITISH LORD CUT LEFT-WING DAUGHTER OFF

LONDON (AP)—All but one of Lord Redesdale's daughters will share in his \$361,000 estate under a will published Wednesday. Cut off without a cent was Jessica, who married a left-winger and named her child for Lenin.
Lord Redesdale, who hated Communists and once was a friend of Hitler, died last March at the age of 80.
He was pleased with seven of his eight daughters. One, Unity, also was Hitler's friend. Another, Diana, married Sir Oswald Mosley, formerly chief of Britain's Fascists.
The daughters became famous as the Mitford girls, bearing the name by which Lord Redesdale was known before he inherited his title.
Jessica Mitford eloped at 18 with Esmond Romilly, Sir Winston Churchill's nephew. Romilly was killed in the Second World War.
Jessica later married a Hungarian, Robert Treuhart. They named their son Tito, but when the Yugoslavs were expelled from the Cominform in 1948 the boy's name was changed to Nicholas after Lenin.
Jessica and her husband now live in Oakland, Calif.
