

PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION. SECOND DAY. Notes of the Exhibits. THE PRIZE LIST.

The horse ring was the leading feature from an early hour this forenoon. Messrs. Davy and McQueen, the British Farmers' Delegates, judged the draft horses. The show of these was, on the whole, disappointing. We anticipated a decided improvement in this class. But neither in point of numbers nor quality were the horses shown superior to those of former years. The class of imported stallions was an interesting one. It included Barriester, Glasnick Blend, Liberty and Lucky Harry. As usual, Barriester carried off first prize. Glasnick Blend taking second, and Lucky Harry third. The other classes were for the most part small, but they included many valuable and useful animals. Mr. Benjamin Hertz exhibited the Percheron stallions Durac and Major. The class of stallions and foals was a very fine one. It included Mr. Stockman's splendid mare with a Barriester foal at her foot, weighing, at six months' old, 850 lbs.

Blake Brothers show a splendid herd of fat cattle, chief among which is a gigantic fat heifer weighing upwards of 2,000 lbs., and an ox weighing nearly as much. These two tip the scale at upwards of 4,000 lbs. They are, we believe, the biggest cattle in Canada to-day. Blake Brothers also show a herd of Herefords, very fat and excellent types of these first-class beef cattle. Mr. Brenton Longworth shows a fine herd of eight pure-bred Shorthorns, and Mr. Benj. Hertz exhibits a herd of six Holsteins—capital types of their kind. A very fine Holstein heifer is shown by Mr. Jacob Bain, of North River. Mr. Donald Ferguson's herd of Galloways contains good specimens of this picturesque breed, though there seems to be something wrong about the young bull with skirts or budding horns; and Mr. Ferguson's Ayrshires and Shorthorns are, as usual, among the best. Mr. John Ferguson is the exhibitor of a fine Ayrshire bull of two years which is, however, rather over-matched by the magnificent Ayrshire bull of the same age, exhibited by Robt. Furness, Vernon River. Mr. E. R. Brown's herd of ten Guernseys—four of which were imported—is greatly admired by fanciers of the milk cow. Mayor Haviland, Dr. Fitzgerald, Mr. L. C. Fowler, Mr. Thomas McLean, and others, exhibit excellent specimens of Jersey cattle. Mr. John C. Carter, of Bay View, shows a superior Shorthorn bull—a big one. There are still too many grades shown; but the number of these is becoming small by degrees and beautifully less. The show of calves, all pure-bred, was one of the best and most hopeful features of the exhibition.

The show of sheep was large and very creditable, in respect to both long-wools and shortwools. The leading exhibitors were Messrs. Boswell, Lane, W. Clarke, Robert Longworth, Benjamin and George Wright, and Mr. Irving, of Vernon River. Six yearling ewes and a ram belonging to Mr. W. Clarke were pointed out to our reporter as animals which would show well even in the Old Country. The results of careful breeding and feeding were very evident in this class.

There is a much larger exhibit of pigs than in any former year; and, what is more pleasing, more of the animals shown are pure-bred and pedigreed—chiefly of the Berkshire, Yorkshire and White Chester breeds. The increase in number and the improvement in quality are largely due to the enterprise of Messrs. S. F. Drake & Brothers, of Pownal, and Mr. Robert Furness, of Vernon River. The former show no less than twenty different pigs, and the latter thirteen or fourteen. In the exhibits of both there are several excellent pure-bred imported boars. Among those of Mr. Furness we noticed "Prince Montford, 1846," and several other pure ones; and among those of the Messrs. Drake a number of prime and imported animals, including "Sir Charles, 1105" (Berkshire), "Snell's Sterling" (Berkshire), and "Hollywell Prince" (improved Yorkshire). Mr. Joseph Praught, of Pownal, exhibited two pens of very pretty Berkshire sows under seven months, and Mr. Robert Drake, of West River, a pair. One of the purest-bred exhibits of pigs is that of Mr. George Wright, who shows a splendid Yorkshire boar and two sows, imported from England last year. Mr. A. B. Warburton exhibits a very fine boar. There are many other exhibitors whose names it was impossible to find out. All pens in the pig-house were occupied and several pens in the calf-house were also taken up by swine of the very best description.

Many of the samples of butter were excellent in grain and flavor, but too many were greasy. These latter had either been churned at too high a temperature or else worked too much. Some of the samples were too salt and in some the salt was not evenly worked in. In a great many of the exhibits the salt was coarse, when the purest table salt should have been used. The home made cheese was very good.

This is a beautiful little model of an invention lately made by the talented superintendent of the P. E. Island Railway, who has studied the principles of electricity in a practical way. We shall not attempt to describe it. It must be seen to be appreciated, and being appreciated it must be admired. It is one of the "cutest" things to be seen in the exhibition building. There is not such another in existence. Those who desire to examine it can do so when at the eastern end of the art exhibit.

Mr. John D. McQuaid, of the P. E. Island Railway, built at considerable expense a snug building, on his own account for the exhibition of his pet birds. These number a hundred and fifty and include a Bengal parrot, several picturesque Island blue jays,

several finches, a number of snow birds, a large number and great variety of canaries. Mr. McQuaid's exhibit is one of the attractions. Lovers of the pretty twittering feathered little songsters flock to see it; and are loud in their praise of Mr. McQuaid's taste and enterprise.
