50,000 Crash Police Lines To Welcome Royal Couple

(Reuters)—A wildly enthusiastic crowd of 50,000 crashed through police lines Tuesday night in front of Queen Elizabeth's hotel to give her one of her most tumultuous welcomes of her Australian tour. Several women were injured in the melee. Harassed police, swept aside by the excited throng, scooped young children up into their arms to keep them from being trampled. The crowd's near hysterical maddened anything seen during Sydney's hectic welcome celebrations in the last week. The mob broke up a cavalcade of cars taking the Queen and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, to the Gollan Hotel here after their 500-mile journey from Sydney by train, car and plane. The royal couple flew the last 300 miles from an airport near the industrial centre of Newcastle. The trip was a bumpy one and they landed here in a rainstorm. More rain — and another rough night — are forecast for today when the Queen and the Duke will see wheat and sheep country on the rolling western plains of New South Wales. After visiting the town of Dubbo they will return to Sydney at night. The Lismore crowd went wild and got out of hand when the royal car pulled up at the hotel. The Queen waved cheerily as she and her husband left their car. But they quickly sought the refuge of the hotel doorway as a solid mass of men, women and children broke through police lines, chanting "God save the Queen." A few minutes later, the royal couple appeared twice on the balcony of the hotel, waving reassuringly. At one point, the Queen looked down anxiously at the jostling sea of upturned faces and touched the Duke's arm. Eventually, police brought the crowd under control. The crowd scenes climaxed the end of the longest and most strenuous day the Queen has endured since she arrived in Australia a week ago. The day began with a rainy farewell to Sydney, where the couple landed in the liner Gothie after a month in New Zealand. Then came the 101-mile train trip to industrial Newcastle, in continuous rain. Soaked Crowds The Queen and the Duke spent much of the journey on the observation platform of their maroon-and-gold-striped train, drawn by twin diesel electric locomotives in royal blue and gold. Soaked but exultant crowds greeted them at every whistle stop. Police at Newcastle had no dif-

New Bridge

Continued from page 1 The new bridge becomes of great value to the trade and commerce of King's. Transported produce moving north to rail and highway connections, or south to vessel and ferry connections, will pass over the new structure, and the elimination of the former bottleneck will expedite in no small measure the faster movement of transportation in the area. Not to be overlooked in the transportation development of King's is the paving of the Seven Mile Road to connect with the Souris highway, and the continuation of the paved road from Murray River to the Wood Islands Ferry Terminal. Owing to the geographical picture of King's and East Queen's, as compared with the other sections of the province, the area requires three east-west highways, one for the north, already completed; one for the central section, already completed; and one in the south already completed as far as the Wood Island ferry terminal. This link could be continued to Murray River to complete the three east-west highways. At the same time, however, owing to the large north-south width, there is also required a north-south connection uniting the three east-west highways, so that transportation from the north need not be required to go to Central Queen's in order to get to its destination in Southern King's or Queen's. Already some approaches have been made respecting this north-south highway, and it is possible that it may be taken under serious consideration in the not too distant future.
