OUR DAIRY FACTORIES.

It is a pleasure to note that, "deficit or no deficit," the Government do not intend to permit our butter and cheese industry to be "nipped in the bud." The Finance Minister... Upon all these grounds, it is not unreasonably urged that the Government would be fully justified in taking our cheese and butter factories upon precisely the same terms as in past years, even though it is true that a small loss to the national treasury has been shown...

TRADE AND MARKETS.

With the opening of navigation there is some animation in business. Extensive imports by the S.S. Stanley and the Northumberland and St. Lawrence have been widely distributed by means of the railway. The roads have been too bad for the movement of produce by our farmers, and little has been moving...

Pork—The market is firmer in tone and stocks are small, but quotations are so far unchanged. Finest prime mess quoted at 56 3/4 to 61 3/4 per 200 lbs.

Butter is quiet, the sales generally being on a small scale at prices favoring buyers. We quote finest Canadian creamery, 76 to 79 per cent; finest States' creamery 56 to 58 per cent; finest American in boxes, 72 to 74; Irish butter—Cork first, 90 per cent; records 64; thirds 48, and fourths 46.

The new order by the Boston police commissioners prohibiting music in saloons and restaurants went into effect Monday. It was adopted to discourage the gathering of both sexes after dark in restaurants.

After referring to his recent visit to Rome and private audience at the Vatican, he expressed his profound gratitude to Leo XIII for his letter to the English people regarding church union.

The first credit of \$12,500,000 for the prosecution of the war in Madagascar has been exhausted, and the French financiers are called upon to meet the bill for additional funds may be secured. If it has cost that sum before even a shot has been fired it is safe to assume that before the war is subdued, quite as large an additional obligation will be incurred.

The statistics of the cotton industry of Canada show that the mills have been in operation at the present time 12,104 looms and 41,252 spindles, and employ 8,216 hands, whose yearly wages amount to \$2,102,949. These figures, it is remarked by the Gazette, correspond practically with those of 1891, the census year.

Almost at the same time that the Canadian commissioners submitted their report on the liquor traffic, a commission appointed by the British government sent in a report concerning the opium traffic in India. The opium commissioners have been a long time carrying on the enquiry, and have examined many hundreds of witnesses.

A CYCLONE'S RAVAGES.

A despatch from Halstead, Kansas, says: A fearful cyclone devastated a strip of country several hundred yards wide on Wednesday afternoon, at 3:30 miles in length, killing six persons outright and seriously injuring several others, while many have received slight injuries.

A despatch from Tokio says the Japanese have received assurances that England would not allow the warships of Russia, Germany or France to pass through the Suez Canal if such vessels should be despatched for the purpose of opposing Japan.
