It is confidently expected that the annual August run will give our present trout population the impetus it needs to assure banner trout fishing for the balance of the season. This columnist is still sticking to his guns in the former assertion that this season, to date, has produced a record run of sea trout. Incidentally boys the trout fishing season in 1952 will open on April 15th and close on September 14th. Trout fishermen never did become accustomed to April 15th as an opening date.

partly slipped it and also slipped to the floor, but was up again instantly and showered John with jabs and hooks. From the 17th round Sullivan tired badly and realization began to dawn on the crowd that the championship was going to change hands. The fighting instinct was still strong in the old gladiator. He tried to rush, but his legs were trembling. He tried to swing, but his weary arms moved slowly. "The spirit was willing but the flesh was weak." The master boxer in front of him had the advantage of youth. John L's fondness for hard spirits did more than anything else to bring about his downfall. Corbett had not the slightest difficulty in avoiding his blows. Despair must have entered his head. There was no hint of it in his grim visage, now van't to pieces and bloody. Indomitably he faced his tormentor, who now began to hit faster and harder. In the 21st round it was Corbett who rushed. Sullivan dragged his legs as he came to the centre of the ring when the gong rang. Fighting like a fiend, Corbett drove the groggy champion across the ring and into his own corner. Drawing Sullivan's guard down with a feint at the body, and indifferent now as to whether or not he hurt his naturally weak hands, Corbett drove two crashing rights straight to the point of the floor, his eyes glassy, but his indomitable fighting brain tried to force his half paralyzed body to lift him to his feet again. The referee counted over him the fatal "ten" while he struggled to get on his feet. His seconds sprang into the ring and assisted the great old warrior to his corner. A new American champion was acclaimed. John Lawrence Sullivan never again crawled through ring ropes as a serious contender for ring honors. After and Corbett met, ten days after their famous battle at Madison Square Garden in New York, Sullivan repeated the words he had spoken from the ring in New Orleans immediately after the battle: "I am glad an American won the championship." The famous old warrior died at his farm in West Abington, Mass., on Feb. 2, 1916, and one of his pall-bearers was Jake Kilrain - a man gnarled and old at that time - crippled with rheumatism but game to the end - as he was on that historic day in 1899, when he fought for the heavyweight title and lost, as much due to the sun's hot rays as to Sullivan's blows. In any attempt to give Sullivan his place in American ring history, it must be remembered that in Corbett he met the first exponent of a new boxing generation, which was to carry ring skill far beyond anything that Sullivan's era had known. The old style could not meet the new skill on even terms. Sullivan relied on paralyzing punching, but you can't paralyze a man who refuses to be hit. This tells the story of the difference between the two men. Nevertheless, Sullivan's strength, speed, and hitting power, fighting instinct and ring ferocity, would have made him a great fighter in any day and generation. If he had learned the game under Queensbury conditions, he would have been a great glove fighter. No one can compare a fighter of one generation with a fighter of another and say which would have won had they met while in their prime - different conditions make accurate comparisons impossible. Such problems must be rated among the "imponderables." One might figure that Dempsey could beat Joe Louis, principally on account of Joe's slow and deliberate way of boxing with an opponent for the first time. He generally did them up quick in any quick performance. Dempsey's disposition of Jess Willard was a superman feat. It would be interesting to ponder how he would have gotten along with Jeffries - when Jeff was in his prime.
