AN INSTANCE.

An illustration of the nature of the co-partnership existing between the Dominion and Provincial Governments is found in the Pineau affair. No matter what the arrangement made, no matter how Pineau has been disposed of, there is no resisting the conclusion that both Provincial and Federal officials of the people are, in some way, highly culpable as to the absence of the "honorable member of the First District of Prince County." His absence was needed by the Provincial Government, and the Dominion Government, its members or officials, co-operated in the work of getting and keeping him away. We do not endorse the statements of our correspondents as true in every respect. But it is certain that Pineau went to Ottawa and that he was led to expect an appointment, that he stayed in Ottawa for some time and that he left at the time that Mr. Tarte departed for Paris, with the \$50,000 *carte blanche*. Since that date, the whereabouts of Pineau is in doubt. Some persons say that he has gone to Paris; others declare that he is in Boston or New York. The main point is that he is absent from this Province, and will not probably be present to fulfil his duty in the Legislative Assembly,—and this as a result of the co-operation of the party here and the party at Ottawa. Without doubt he is paid by the party machine to stay away,—after the manner of the vote stealer Pritchett. This is the kind of work that the present Provincial and Federal rulers of Canada are engaged in, under the existing co-partnership. How long will the people permit it? How long will they tolerate the unholy alliance between the rascals of the Liberal party in the Provinces and the rascals of the Liberal party of Canada?

ANOTHER REPLY.

In reply to Prohibitionist, we beg to say that THE EXAMINER'S views concern Provincial Prohibition have already been explicitly stated. We are opposed to Provincial Prohibition (1) because it is not what the people voted for in the plebiscite, (2) because it will not stop the importation of liquors which—as experience with the Canada Temperance Act has proved—is essential to a material diminution of drunkenness; (3) because it will divert attention from the movement towards National prohibition and is as a red herring drawn across the track of those guilty of the plebiscite perfidy, who are striving to avoid the only punishment that the people can administer. As to the "P. S.," we have to say that if the Liberal-Conservative Party should repeal the Charlottetown License Law and collect the \$9,000 or \$10,000 in some other way, and shall continue to it.
