## Joseph MacDonald Dies After Illness

Joseph W. MacDonald, QC, Charlottetown, died Saturday in the Sacred Heart Home. He was 81. Death followed a long illness.

A native of Grand Tracadie, he was a son of the late John William MacDonald and his wife, the former Catherine A. MacDonald.

Before he entered the law profession he taught school in several districts of the Province. For a number of years he served as magistrate for Kings County. Surviving are his wife, the former Lottie Hughes of Souris now residing in Ottawa, two

daughters, Ellen Douglas MacDonald, also of Ottawa and Flora, married in the United States.

Two brothers and a sister also survive. They are: Rev. Leonard MacDonald, Roman Catholic parish priest at Wellington; Bernard in Grand Tracadie; and Mary Ellen, Mrs. John C. MacDonald, Charlottetown.

The funeral will be held Tuesday morning with Solemn Requiem High Mass at St. Eugene's Church, Corran Ban at 10 o'clock.

### Goodwill Week Is Announced

Kiwanis International is spearheading the 43rd annual observance of Canada - U.S. Goodwill Week, April 24 - 30. This year also marks the 50th anniversary of its service in both the United States and Canada.

Kiwanis was founded in Detroit, Michigan in 1915. The first club in Canada was founded in Hamilton, Ontario in 1916. "Thus Kiwanis has grown-up simultaneously in both these nations," said J. Frank MacMillan, president of the Kiwanis Club of Charlottetown.

He went on to say that April 28, which falls within Canada-U.S. Goodwill Week, is the 149th anniversary of the signing of the Rush-Bagot Agreement which demilitarized the 3000 mile border between Canada and the United States; hence the dates selected for the "week."

To dramatize the peaceful nature of this coast-to-coast boundary line, Kiwanians in both countries have worked together to set up some 35 "peace markers," one at each principal port of entry.

"Kiwanis has worked constantly in this, and in other ways, to cement even further the good neighborliness which is the hallmark of Canadian-U.S. relations," J. Frank MacMillan added. Canada - U.S. Goodwill Week, which is now widely observed, was established by Kiwanis.

President Lyndon B. Johnson, commenting on Canada-U.S. relations, has said, "On that border we have no soldiers. We have no weapons. We have only long and enduring friends."
